

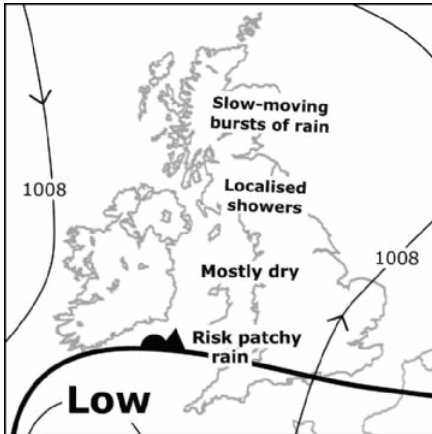
Peak District

General Summary for Sunday, 5 May, 2024



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 5 May, 2024

A slack weather pattern with light winds and fairly humid air. A lot of cloud around the mountains with patchy drizzle in the morning. Cloud lifting and breaking a little into the afternoon, but local thundery downpours will form, greatest risk for the Cairngorms area. Some rain moves into Wales from the south.

Headline for Peak District

Light winds, hills mostly clear with sunny spells.

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 5 May, 2024

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwest later southerly 5 to 10mph, occasionally 15mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Small
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Mostly dry Bar an isolated shower or two, dry conditions will prevail through the day.
Cloud on the hills?	Mostly clear A few patches of cloud here and there on some slopes in the morning, but will disperse to leave the hills clear.
Chance of cloud free summits?	80%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	A mix of cloud and patchy sun. Visibility very good.
Temperature (at 600m)	8C lifting to 11C
And in the valleys	Lifting to 17 to 19C

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	East to northeast 5 to 15mph, risk though of higher gusts around any heavy showers. Mostly small	Variable or northerly 5-10mph or less. Small
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Thundery showers forming After a mostly dry morning, clouds will bubble up towards and into the afternoon; slow-moving heavy showers forming, risk local thunderstorms later afternoon.	Risk heavy showers later Likely dry morning into early afternoon, then risk local showers forming, possibly heavy with a chance of thunder later in the day.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Low cloud lifting off the tops. Banks of low cloud at varying heights from dawn, some hills perhaps clear. Bases will tend to rise of the tops and clear, but reforming in showers. Lifting to 70%	All clearing Patchy cloud on some slopes and fog some valleys at first. Will generally all disperse by middle of day. 70%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Cloudy periods, but also spells where the sun breaks through. Visibility good or very good at times, but poor in any heavy showers.	Varied cloud and occasional sun. Visibility good.
Temperature (at 600m) And in the valleys	9 to 12C 9C at dawn, rising to 17 to 19C	8 to 12C. 7C at dawn, rising to 16 to 18C.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 6 May, 2024

Weather patterns remain slow-moving, but high pressure tends to build into midweek to bring a fair amount of dry weather which may well last through next weekend. Briefly cooler in northern Scotland early in the week, but mostly fairly warm and winds often light. Some rain-bearing fronts may return to northwestern Scotland at times. Occasional scattered showers in the afternoons elsewhere.
