
The Northwest Highlands

Areas north from Knoydart in the west, and the Great Glen towards the east (NB. Does not include Mull and areas west of Loch Linnhe, these are found in the West Highlands forecast.)



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General Summary for Wednesday, 17 April, 2024



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 17 April, 2024

Chilly northerly winds, tending to ease across the Highlands. Staying near or below freezing over higher tops. A scattering of hail and hill snow showers, focused over eastern Scotland, also Pennine areas by afternoon. Western Scotland mostly dry. Early showers for Wales turns into steadier rain in the west here by afternoon.

Headline for The Northwest Highlands

Wind dropping lighter. Often dry, local brief snow or hail.

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 17 April, 2024

How windy? (On the Munros)	Northwesterly 15 to 25mph in the morning, likely to drop to 10mph or less into the afternoon. Speeds starting to increase again into the night.		
Effect of wind on you?	Marked wind chill early in the day, becoming small.		
How wet? (Precipitation and its	Local showers One or two brief showers with soft hail, and snow flurries on higher slopes.		
impact)	Some areas largely dry all day, especially Wester Ross to Kintail. Drizzly showers may occasionally affect Skye. Well into night, drizzly rain and summit snow pushing onto western mountains.

	Patchy cloud on higher slopes in the morning, mostly lifting toward or above the tops. Cloud may come and go near coasts.

Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Some sunshine, but fairly weak at times due to high cloud. Visibility mostly very good.		
How Cold? (at 900m)	-2C rising toward +1C afternoon. Wind chill feeling like -10C early in the day.		
Freezing Level	600-700m plus frost in sheltered inland glens at first. Rising to 900 to 1000m afternoon, locally higher near Kintail.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 18 April, 2024

Briefly just above freezing to highest Scottish tops on Thursday daytime. A period of rain and drizzle preceded by snow on tops coming in from the west, wettest over western Scotland. By Thursday night, dropping back to freezing to 800m from the north. Staying near freezing over high tops into Friday with a scattering of brief hail showers on brisk northwesterly winds. A fine and milder weekend for many as high pressure builds. W-SW'ly breezes in northern Scotland with patchy rain in the northwest. High pressure stays nearby into next week, but cool northeasterly breezes are likely - near or below freezing on tops with overnight frost into glens. Sunny spells and scattered showers with hail and snow.

Forecast issued at 16:30 on Tuesday, 16 April, 2024
