


Peak District

General Summary for Monday, 6 May, 2024



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 6 May, 2024

Central, east and southern Scotland sees areas of rain from early in the day - these then redeveloping into local thundery downpours into afternoon. For England and Wales, scattered heavy and locally thundery showers also forming later. Winds fairly light overall. Varied cloud bases, limited sun.

Headline for Peak District

Dry morning, then showers, local thunderstorms afternoon.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 6 May, 2024

How windy? (On the summits)	Variable or east to northeasterly, 5 to 10mph. Occasional stronger gusts later in day around local heavy showers.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Thundery showers forming afternoon After a mostly dry morning, clouds will bubble up towards and into the afternoon; initially brief showers, but increasingly slow-moving heavy showers forming, risk local thunderstorms later afternoon.
Cloud on the hills?	Soon mostly clear Patchy cloud on some hills from dawn, but many hills likely often clear all day. Local patches lowering where showers occur.
Chance of cloud free summits?	80%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Cloudy periods, but also spells where the sun breaks through. Visibility good or very good at times, but poor in any heavy showers.
Temperature (at 600m)	8 to 11C
And in the valleys	7C at dawn, rising to 15 to 17C

How windy? (On the summits)	Variable or northerly 5-10mph or less.	Southwesterly 10 to 15mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Small	Small
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Risk isolated showers later Likely dry morning into early afternoon, then risk local showers forming, an odd heavy burst possible later, chance an isolated thunderstorm.	Rain unlikely
Cloud on the hills?	All clearing Patchy cloud on some slopes and fog some valleys at first. Will generally all disperse by middle of day.	Clearing tops Patchy cloud around some slopes, plus local mist some valleys at first. Soon clearing.
Chance of cloud free summits?	80%	80%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Varied cloud and occasional sun. Visibility good.	Patchwork of sun. Visibility very good.
Temperature (at 600m)	8 to 12C.	7 to 11C.
And in the valleys	7C at dawn, rising to 16 to 18C.	5 to 7C at dawn, rising to 15 to 17C.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 7 May, 2024**

High pressure builds from the west to be centred over England and Wales into midweek. A fair amount of dry weather in the outlook which may well last through next weekend. Isolated afternoon showers some days. Some weak fronts drifting in from the Atlantic on southwesterly winds bring a risk of occasional rain to the West and Northwest Highlands, with mountains covered in cloud for periods here, especially near to coasts in west. Often dry with higher cloud bases toward the central and eastern Highlands. Briefly cooler in northern Scotland early in the week, but mostly fairly warm and winds often light.
