

General Summary for Friday, 10 May, 2024



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 10 May, 2024

Extensively dry across much of the country with any morning cloud, if any, soon evaporating. Light winds except in the West and Northwest Highlands, where it will be locally gusty. Widespread sunshine developing through high cloud; summits feeling mild.

Detailed Forecast for Friday, 10 May, 2024

How windy? (On the summits)	South to southwesterly 5 to 15mph.	
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small.	
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain not expected	
Cloud on the hills?	Hills clear	
	Any morning mist on highest tops will soon burn off.	
Chance of cloud free summits?	Almost certain.	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly sunny and thin high clouds. Slight haze.	
Temperature (at 600m)	12 to 14C.	
And in the valleys	10C at dawn, rising to 20C.	





Peak District - Looking Ahead

	Saturday 11 May	Sunday 12 May
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	South to southwesterly 10 to 20mph. Small.	Southerly 10 to 15mph, stronger during gusts. Beware powerful gusts before thundery afternoon showers. Balance affected during gusts. In the afternoon, powerful gusts before showers may knock you off balance.
How wet?	Rain unlikely	Increasing risk of localised thunderstorms.
(Precipitation and its impact)	Small chance of showers near and north of Manchester in the afternoon.	Occasional spots of rain falling from high level cloud from morning. Increasing risk of local showers and possibly even torrential thunderstorms by late afternoon. Persistent rain overnight as front moves in from evening.
Cloud on the hills?	Possible fog in the morning	Most upland clear until rain forms
	Moderate risk of fog at dawn, especially at lower elevations.	A few patches of mist in the morning, including in the valleys. During heavier showers, cloud will soon envelop higher ground and mid-slopes for a time.
Chance of cloud free summits?	80%	70%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly sunny, but hazy. Fair-weather clouds building up in the afternoon.	Patches of sunshine fading as high cloud thickens through day. Hazy or very hazy in morning. Haze mostly washed out by afternoon showers.
Temperature (at 600m)	14 to 16C. Feeling cool in the wind at times, especially when not in direct sunshine.	14C. Feeling around 10C in the wind.
And in the valleys	12C at dawn, rising to 21C.	10 to 12 rising to around 22C by mid-afternoon.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 11 May, 2024

High pressure drifting eastwards during the weekend, whilst southerly breezes brings warmer air and often clear skies, with most places staying dry. A greater risk of showers or thunderstorms by Sunday. Low pressure bringing wet and windier weather for a day or two Monday onwards. Becoming showery from Tuesday or Wednesday with varying cloud banks across many mountain areas. Temperatures remaining mild.
