


Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

General Summary for Sunday, 5 May, 2024



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 5 May, 2024

A slack weather pattern with light winds and fairly humid air. A lot of cloud around the mountains with patchy drizzle in the morning. Cloud lifting and breaking a little into the afternoon, but local thundery downpours will form, greatest risk for the Cairngorms area. Some rain moves into Wales from the south.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Light winds, hills often clear, chance of a shower forming.

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 5 May, 2024

How windy? (On the summits)	South to southeasterly 10 to 15mph, may drop out at times.
Effect of wind on you?	Small
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Isolated showers, risk rain later south Chance of isolated showers into the afternoon as clouds bubble up. In mid-Wales, risk of rain moving up from the south later in the day.
Cloud on the hills?	Patches coming and going over tops Generally good breaks through the day when the hills are clear. However some patches will form at times across higher slopes, mainly in the morning, locally if showers form.
Chance of cloud free summits?	70%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	A mix of cloud and patchy sun. Visibility very good.
How Cold? (at 900m)	6C
Freezing Level	Above the summits

<p>How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)</p>	<p>Thundery showers forming</p> <p>After a mostly dry morning, clouds will bubble up towards and into the afternoon; slow-moving heavy showers forming, risk local thunderstorms later afternoon.</p>	<p>Risk isolated showers</p> <p>Mostly dry, but risk of a localised shower forming, mostly inland and eastern Wales afternoon into evening.</p>
<p>Cloud on the hills?</p> <p>Chance of cloud free summits?</p>	<p>Banks of low cloud, lifting and breaking</p> <p>Banks of low cloud at varying heights from dawn, some hills perhaps clear. Bases will tend to rise and break up with clearances, but reforming in showers.</p> <p>Lifting to 60%</p>	<p>Lifting toward then above many tops</p> <p>Banks of cloud on some slopes for a time in the morning, mainly northern areas where may cover tops for a several hours around Carneddau. Tending to lift and break above many tops in afternoon.</p> <p>50%</p>
<p>Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)</p>	<p>Cloudy periods, but also spells where the sun breaks through, best Llyn peninsula. Visibility good or very good at times, but poor in any heavy showers.</p>	<p>Varied cloud and occasional sun. Visibility good.</p>
<p>How Cold? (at 900m)</p> <p>Freezing Level</p>	<p>7 to 9C</p> <p>Above the summits</p>	<p>7 to 9C.</p> <p>Above the summits</p>

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 6 May, 2024

Weather patterns remain slow-moving, but high pressure tends to build into midweek to bring a fair amount of dry weather which may well last through next weekend. Briefly cooler in northern Scotland early in the week, but mostly fairly warm and winds often light. Some rain-bearing fronts may return to northwestern Scotland at times. Occasional scattered showers in the afternoons elsewhere.
