

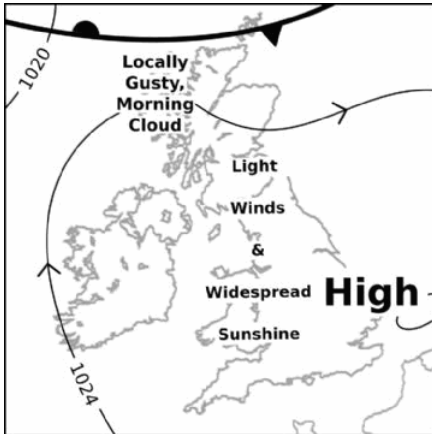

General Summary for Friday, 10 May, 2024



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 10 May, 2024

Extensively dry across much of the country with any morning cloud, if any, soon evaporating. Light winds except in the West and Northwest Highlands, where it will be locally gusty. Widespread sunshine developing through high cloud; summits feeling mild.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Widespread sunshine. Some wind on western summits.

Detailed Forecast for Friday, 10 May, 2024

How windy? (On the summits)	South 15 to 25mph, strongest on western summits toward Llyn Peninsula in the afternoon.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small, may affect walking and balance on the highest ridges.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain not expected
Cloud on the hills?	Hills clear
Chance of cloud free summits?	Almost certain.
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly sunny and thin high clouds. Slight haze.
How Cold? (at 900m)	10 to 12C. Feeling around 5C in the wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Eryri / Snowdonia National Park - Looking Ahead

	Saturday 11 May	Sunday 12 May
How windy? (On the summits)	Southerly 10 to 20mph.	Southerly 10 to 15mph, stronger during gusts. Beware powerful gusts before thundery afternoon showers.
Effect of wind on you?	Small.	Balance affected during gusts. In the afternoon, powerful gusts before showers may knock you off balance.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Remote risk of local showers afternoon Mostly dry, in the afternoon low chance of isolated showers around Yr Wyddfa/Snowdon and the Berwyn Mountains.	Increasing risk of localised thunderstorms. Spots of rain falling from high level cloud from morning. Increasing risk of local showers and possibly even torrential thunderstorms by late afternoon. Persistent rain overnight as front moves in from evening.
Cloud on the hills?	Hills mostly clear Patches of fog in the valleys at dawn.	Most mountains clear until rain forms A few patches of mist in the morning, including in the valleys. During heavier showers, cloud will soon envelop higher ground and mid-slopes for a time.
Chance of cloud free summits?	90%	70%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly sunny, but hazy. Clouds building up in the afternoon.	Pockets of sunshine fading as high cloud thickens through day. Hazy or very hazy in morning. Haze mostly washed out by afternoon showers.
How Cold? (at 900m)	10 to 12C. Feeling around 5C in the wind, especially when not in direct sunshine.	9 to 12C, warmest in eastern areas. Feeling as cold as 5C in the wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.	Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 11 May, 2024

High pressure drifting eastwards during the weekend, whilst southerly breezes brings warmer air and often clear skies, with most places staying dry. A greater risk of showers or thunderstorms by Sunday. Low pressure bringing wet and windier weather for a day or two Monday onwards. Becoming showery from Tuesday or Wednesday with varying cloud banks across many mountain areas. Temperatures remaining mild.
