
Southeastern Highlands

The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Ben Alder, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Wednesday, 17 April, 2024



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 17 April, 2024

Chilly northerly winds, tending to ease across the Highlands. Staying near or below freezing over higher tops. A scattering of hail and hill snow showers, focused over eastern Scotland, also Pennine areas by afternoon. Western Scotland mostly dry. Early showers for Wales turns into steadier rain in the west here by afternoon.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Chilly wind easing. Snow and hail showers mostly in east.

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 17 April, 2024

How windy? (On the Munros)	Northerly 20 to 30mph in the morning, strongest around dawn, up to 40-50mph for a time around first light in eastern areas Likely to ease to 10-15mph perhaps less later afternoon into evening.		
Effect of wind on you?	Marked wind chill and very blustery for a time early in the day, lessening to become small.		
How wet?	Local showers, snow flurries, mostly east		
(Precipitation and its impact)	Occasional brief showers with soft hail, and snow flurries on higher slopes, focused over eastern areas, becoming fewer with time. Rare showers into the central highlands, more often dry all day toward the Trossachs.		
Cloud on the hills?	Many central tops often clear		
	Patchy cloud on higher slopes in the morning, mostly lifting toward or above the tops. Will come and go over eastern hills for a few hours around showers.		
Chance of cloud free Munros?	50% east, 70% west.		
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Some sunshine, but weak at times due to areas of high cloud. Visibility excellent.		
How Cold? (at 900m)	-3C rising to +2 or 3C afternoon. Wind chill feeling like -10C or below early in the day.		
Freezing Level	600m plus frost in sheltered glens at first. Rising toward 1100-1200m afternoon. Slightly lower by dusk.

Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Any weak sun giving way as high cloud builds, becoming overcast and dull. Visibility reducing in rain.	Broken cloud and sun. Visibility excellent.
How Cold? (at 900m)	0C rising to 3C. Wind chill feeling like -10C or colder as speeds strengthen.	-1 to +2C. Wind chill feeling like -10C or below in strongest wind in morning.
Freezing Level	900m early morning, slight frost in glens; lifting above all tops by afternoon, but then into night dropping back to 900-1000m.	800-900m rising to 1000-1100m, highest west of the A9.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 18 April, 2024

Briefly just above freezing to highest Scottish tops on Thursday daytime. A period of rain and drizzle preceded by snow on tops coming in from the west, wettest over western Scotland. By Thursday night, dropping back to freezing to 800m from the north. Staying near freezing over high tops into Friday with a scattering of brief hail showers on brisk northwesterly winds. A fine and milder weekend for many as high pressure builds. W-SW'ly breezes in northern Scotland with patchy rain in the northwest. High pressure stays nearby into next week, but cool northeasterly breezes are likely - near or below freezing on tops with overnight frost into glens. Sunny spells and scattered showers with hail and snow.
