

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General Summary for Saturday, 4 May, 2024



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 4 May, 2024

A broad and very slack area of low pressure will edge north bringing extensive low cloud and areas of drizzle, with again bursts of heavy, perhaps locally thundery rain, developing into Scotland. Best breaks in cloud and sun in the northwest Highlands, and clearer, brighter conditions developing for southern Wales.

Headline for Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

Extensive hill fog and murky conditions with patches of rain and drizzle. Gusty.

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 4 May, 2024

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly, likely to vary, often 15 to 25mph, risk gusty 30mph high tops.		
Effect of wind on you?	Varied over the fells, risk blustery for periods over exposed higher terrain.		
How wet?	Drizzle, occasional bursts of rain		
(Precipitation and its impact)	Drizzly in hill fog, plus bursts of rain almost anywhere on and off through the day.		
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive, widely to lowest slopes.		
	Blanket fog from many mid-slopes upward through the day, some varied banks at different heights for periods. Tending to rise slowly in afternoon, but unlikely to clear other than local breaks.		
Chance of cloud free summits?	20%		
Sunshine?	Overcast. Hazy, and often murky, especially in and around rain.

How Cold? (at 700m)	6 to 9C.		
And in the valleys	8C at dawn, rising to max 15C, but several degrees cooler if in rain.

	Be prepared for extensive hill fog through the day. Lowest bases in the morning, but bases rising into the afternoon to higher slopes, may completely clear in the east. Chance of cloud free summits?	40%	Lifting to 60%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Little or no sun. Rather hazy, and for periods in the morning murky. May become good afternoon.	Cloudy periods, but also spells where the sun breaks through, best afternoon coast. Visibility good or very good at times, but poor in any heavy showers.
How Cold? (at 700m)	Around 7 or 8C, but 5C near west coast at first.	8 or 9C

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 5 May, 2024

Slow-moving weather patterns continue through the Bank Holiday weekend as a weak zone of low pressure dominates over the British Isles. There will remain uncertainty of local day-to-day detail, but most likely the wind often light and temperatures generally mild, but less warm than midweek in western Scotland. Sunday into Monday, will see varied zones of heavy showers forming, local thunderstorms, but some places escaping often dry with the best sunny breaks for coastal areas as the convection builds inland. High pressure then tends to build from the west into midweek to bring a fair amount of dry weather, although rain bearing fronts may return to the northwest at times.
