
Also includes all higher summits in southern half of Wales.



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General Summary for Wednesday, 15 November, 2017



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 15 November, 2017

A warm front will push north, leaving grey and damp conditions in Wales, SW Scotland and some Pennine areas, with fog to low levels, especially around coasts. Brighter in northern Scotland, with many summits free of low cloud. Winds strengthening, later gale force in W & NW Highlands.

Headline for Brecon Beacons

Winds mostly light. Generally dull and damp; extensive fog.

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 15 November, 2017

How windy? (On the summits)	Variable or westerly, becoming southwesterly, less than 10mph morning, strengthening to 15mph, later 20mph on western hills during afternoon.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small.
How wet?	A little drizzle Patches of drizzly rain will come and go across western hills through the day, but total amounts small. Very little if any reaching east Wales.
Cloud on the hills?	Widespread low cloud Cloud will widely shroud the hills most of the day. Bases around 400-500m, but patches to low levels, and in morning, generally murky from valleys upward.
Chance of cloud free summits?	10%
Sunshine and air clarity?	Rare if any sun. Murky overall, with fog to low levels some areas in morning, which may struggle to lift all day, at best becoming hazy.
How Cold? (at 750m)	7C
Freezing Level	Above tops

Brecon Beacons - Looking Ahead

	Thursday 16 November	Friday 17 November
How windy? (On the summits)	Southwest then westerly, 30 to 40mph, may later ease to 20-25mph.	West or northwesterly, 20 to 30mph, perhaps less for a few hours.
Effect of wind on you?	Walking impeded and noticeable wind chill on higher areas; easing as the day progresses.	May impede walking on higher areas, with considerable wind chill where exposed.
How wet?	Rain may persist A belt of rain likely to persist for several hours during the day (timing uncertain), heaviest in west.	Dry overall Rare if any brief showers; snow highest summits.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive Widely shrouding the hills, perhaps for many hours, locally from low levels up near west coast. Bases may slowly lift later should rain clear.	Mostly higher western areas Typically confined above 600-700m, with breaks to many high tops, especially eastern areas, but may often cover higher western summits.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20%	60%
Sunshine and air clarity?	Rare or no sun. Visibility may be poor much of the day.	Occasional sun, best in east. The air quite clear overall.
How Cold? (at 750m)	4 to 6C	2C
Freezing Level	Above tops.	Just above highest summits

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 16 November, 2017**

Windy on Thursday with upland gales ahead of a band of heavy rain which will push south-eastwards. Showery and colder conditions will then follow, lasting into Friday and the weekend. Upland gales or sever gales will give severe wind chill, but should ease at least for a time over the weekend. Renewed snow will accumulate over the mountains.

Indications for the later part of November favour generally cold conditions dominating, with further snowfalls possible.
