

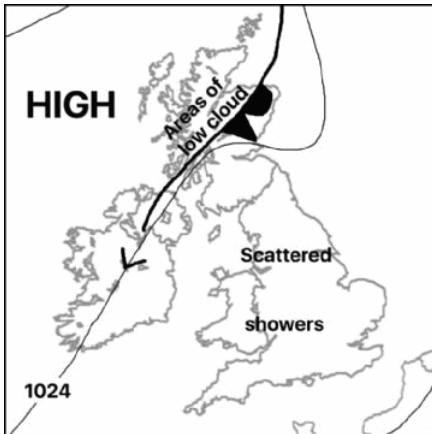
# Brecon Beacons

Also includes all higher summits in southern half of Wales.



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## General Summary for Thursday, 12 July, 2018



**British Mountain Summary:**  
**Based on forecast chart for noon 12 July, 2018**

A weak front will bring largely cloudy and damp conditions across the Scottish Highlands with cloud shrouding the hills much of the day; but tending to lift to higher slopes with local showers breaking out. Elsewhere, early patches of mist and low cloud will lift and clear, but scattered showers will develop.

**Headline for Brecon Beacons**

Patchy mist and low cloud clearing. Scattered showers developing.

## Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 12 July, 2018

<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>	Direction variable, rarely more than 5mph.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	<b>Negligible</b>
<b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Scattered showers</b> Many places substantially dry, but isolated patches of rain or drizzle locally in the morning. However, scattered showers will develop into the afternoon. However, some areas will miss these and stay dry.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Becoming very little</b> Patches of low cloud, or mist in some valleys from dawn. Cloud likely all lifting above the hills through the morning.
<b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>80%</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	Sunshine and variable cloud, may fill in at times. Visibility typically good; slight haze.
<b>How Cold? (at 750m)</b>	13 to 15C
<b>Freezing Level</b>	Above the summits

<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>	Direction variable, little wind much of day. Locally gusty around showers.	Westerly around 5 to 10mph.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	<b>Mostly negligible</b>	<b>Negligible</b>
<b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Chance a thunderstorm</b> A few drizzly outbreaks or even a local burst of rain possible from early morning, but many places often dry. Increasing risk of a local heavy shower or isolated thunderstorm inland afternoon/evening.	<b>Isolated, if any, showers</b> Very likely dry all day. However, small risk of an isolated shower developing into the afternoon.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Mostly very little</b>  Patches of cloud on some hills, and local mist in valleys post-dawn. Fragments becoming confined above 700-900m, and soon clearing to higher tops.	<b>Very little</b>  A few patches of cloud will cap the highest tops at times; mainly in the morning.
<b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>70%</b>	<b>80%</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	Occasional sunshine breaking through, sunniest near coast in afternoon.  Visibility typically very good; locally murky early in day.	Periods of sunshine.  Visibility generally very good.
<b>How Cold? (at 750m)</b>	13 to 16C, quite humid.	14C
<b>Freezing Level</b>	Above the summits	Above the summits

**Planning Outlook****All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 13 July, 2018**

Pressure stays fairly high on Friday, but some instability in the atmosphere will trigger a few showers over the hills - local thunderstorms possible. Areas of low cloud, but also breaks to many higher summits. Winds generally very light. By the weekend, weak fronts to edge east across Scotland bringing a little drizzly rain and low cloud; mainly across western hills. It will remain largely dry across England and Wales. A fairly slack pressure pattern is likely into next week, and with a warm and quite humid airmass in place, showers will develop; these perhaps more widespread later in the week.
