


# Lake District

Includes the whole of Cumbria, and also the western Pennines North from Ingleborough.



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## General Summary for Friday, 13 July, 2018



**British Mountain Summary:  
Based on forecast chart for noon 13 July, 2018**

A fairly humid day with little wind. Isolated patches of rain or drizzle in the morning will develop into scattered showers by afternoon. These will be heaviest from southern Scotland southwards with some isolated thunderstorms. Areas of low cloud in the morning will lift to higher tops into the afternoon. Best conditions in the northwest Highlands.

**Headline for Lake District**

Fairly humid, little wind. Cloud lifting to high tops. Showers developing.

## Detailed Forecast for Friday, 13 July, 2018

<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>	Direction variable, little wind much of day. Locally gusty around showers.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	<b>Mostly negligible</b>
<b>How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)</b>	<b>Risk of a thunderstorm</b> A few drizzly outbreaks or even a local burst of rain possible from early morning, but many places often dry. Increasing threat of local heavy showers or thunderstorms afternoon/evening.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Low cloud lifting to high tops</b> Banks of cloud at various levels from lower slopes up post-dawn. Most cloud lifting above 700-900m by afternoon or perhaps sooner. However, patches will reform to lower slopes in rain.
<b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>60%</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	Occasional sunshine breaking through, sunniest near coast in afternoon. Visibility typically very good; locally murky early in day.
<b>How Cold? (at 750m)</b>	13 to 15C, quite humid.
<b>Freezing Level</b>	Above the summits

	<b>Saturday 14 July</b>	<b>Sunday 15 July</b>
<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>	Westerly 10-15mph, later 20mph.	West to southwest 10-15mph; highest along coastal hills.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	<b>Mostly small</b>	<b>Small</b>
<b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Isolated, if any, showers</b> Very likely dry all day. However, small risk of an isolated shower developing into the afternoon.	<b>Rain unlikely</b> Small risk of rare patches of light rain or drizzle across western hills.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Very little until evening</b>  A few patches of cloud will cap higher tops at times; mainly in the morning. During the evening, cloud may become extensive across higher areas above 700-800m.	<b>Low cloud lifting to higher tops in west.</b>  Banks of low cloud from dawn will lift and generally clear by midday. However, a few patches may continue to come and go into the afternoon across the highest Fell tops.
<b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>70%</b>	<b>60%</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	Periods of sunshine, clouding over towards evening.  Visibility generally very good.	Occasional sunshine breaking through, mainly across eastern hills.  Visibility generally very good.
<b>How Cold? (at 750m)</b>	13C	14C
<b>Freezing Level</b>	Above the summits	Above the summits

**Planning Outlook****All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 14 July, 2018**

Over the weekend, weak fronts to edge east across Scotland bringing a little drizzly rain and low cloud; mainly across western hills. It will remain largely dry and warm across England and Wales with occasional sunshine. A fairly slack pressure pattern into the start of next week, and with a warm and quite humid airmass in place, showers will develop; these locally thundery, and perhaps more widespread later in the week. Areas of low cloud will shroud the hills at times.
