



General Summary for Tuesday, 20 June, 2017



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 20 June, 2017

A slow-moving front will lie across N England, bringing areas of low cloud, mainly to the Pennines. Very warm Wales and perhaps Peak District with extensive sunshine, beware sunburn, but risk of isolated thunderstorms. Scotland, fine some sunshine, particularly west.

Headline for Peak District and Yorkshire Dales

Cloud gradually lifting to clear most hills. Occasional sun western hills.

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 20 June, 2017

How windy? (On the summits)	Northeasterly 10mph, becoming southeasterly 15-20mph late afternoon.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small.
How wet?	No rain expected
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive at first, generally lifting Fairly extensive cloud, with bases around 400-500m will likely shroud the hills, especially eastern Dales post dawn. However, the cloud will lift progressively to clear, most summits by early afternoon. May not clear higher tops north Yorkshire
Chance of cloud free summits?	Becoming 60% by afternoon
Sunshine and air clarity?	Occasional sunshine developing more western slopes. Slight haze.
Temperature (at 600m)	14 to 17C
And in the valleys	16C some eastern dales, up to 22C western dales, particularly south of Skipton.

Peak District and Yorkshire Dales - Looking Ahead

	Wednesday 21 June	Thursday 22 June
How windy? (On the summits)	Southerly: 10-20mph Later increasing 30-40mph and becoming quite gusty.	Westerly 20-25mph, strongest around dawn and again at dusk.
Effect of wind on you?	Significant buffeting on exposed slopes developing.	Mostly fairly small.
How wet?	Risk of scattered thunderstorms Risk of showery bursts of rain/scattered thunderstorms developing.	Substantially dry Isolated pockets of drizzle to start the day, soon clearing.
Cloud on the hills?	Occasionally shrouding hills Cloud bases tending to vary through the day, but temporarily shrouding higher summits with patches possible down to lower slopes, these most likely morning.	Cloud generally lifting for a time during afternoon Cloud fairly extensive through the morning, but will likely lift to perhaps clear higher summits for a time during the afternoon, before lowering again into the evening.
Chance of cloud free summits?	50%	40%
Sunshine and air clarity?	Hazy sunshine coming here and there. Visibility locally poor in rain, otherwise good but a little hazy.	Glimpses of sunshine breaking through during afternoon Visibility generally very good
Temperature (at 600m)	18-22C	11-13C
And in the valleys	In the valleys: 24 to 28C, highest south Peak District	16-20C, highest Peak District

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 21 June, 2017**

During the second half of this week, the winds will turn west or southwesterly and increasingly bring frequent rain and low cloud to western mountains; particularly the west and northwest Highlands. Elsewhere total rainfall will remain fairly small, with driest conditions eastern mountains.
