



General Summary for Sunday, 13 August, 2017



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 13 August, 2017

A transient ridge of high pressure will cross the UK during the day. There will be a few showers over Scottish highlands and here cloud will persist on higher western summits. Elsewhere, hills largely cloud free, patches of sun and light and.

Headline for Snowdonia National Park

Largely dry and cloud free

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 13 August, 2017

How windy? (On the summits)	Variable in direction, 10mph or less. Becoming southerly 15-20mph during evening.
Effect of wind on you?	Negligible until evening
How wet?	Rain not expected Dry most of the day. Small risk of a little rain spreading inland from dusk.
Cloud on the hills?	Mostly very little Any early banks of low cloud or valley fog will soon lift and disperse to leave all hills clear of cloud by midday. May deteriorate again across higher areas around dusk.
Chance of cloud free summits?	70%
Sunshine and air clarity?	Occasional sunshine and very good visibilities.
How Cold? (at 900m)	8-9C
Freezing Level	Above the summits

	Monday 14 August	Tuesday 15 August
How windy? (On the summits)	South to southwesterly 20-30mph	Southwest veering westerly: 15-25mph
Effect of wind on you?	May impede walking across higher areas	Mainly small
How wet?	Rain on and off Rain or showers on and off for much of the day will be heaviest and most persistent across western hills. Into the afternoon, rain may well ease off for a few hours, before becoming persistent later in the day.	Showers, perhaps longer spells of rain Showery rain on and off for much of the day, heaviest and most persistent Snowdon and Cadair Idris areas. Perhaps becoming drier towards evening from the west.
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive Cloud will tend to be fairly extensive throughout the day, especially on western coastal hills, with bases lowest here. Although eastern hills may be clear around dawn.	Fairly extensive Most if not all hills shrouded in cloud for much of the day especially western hills. Bases tending to lift and break further east and towards mid-Wales afternoon outside showers/rain.
Chance of cloud free summits?	40%	30%
Sunshine and air clarity?	Little or no sun. Visibility often poor in hill fog, but temporally improving in the afternoon.	Fairly extensive poor visibility in hill fog morning. Glimpses of sunshine by afternoon with very good visibility developing.
How Cold? (at 900m)	9-10C	8 to 10C
Freezing Level	Above the summits	Above summits

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 14 August, 2017**

A continuation of the current unsettled weather pattern through next week with southwesterly winds bringing bands of low cloud and rain countrywide, although a transient ridge of high pressure will result in an improvement in conditions on Tuesday. From midweek onwards, increasing threat of upland gales and on western mountains heavy rain with areas of low pressure passing close by the UK.
