



## General Summary for Thursday, 14 June, 2018



**British Mountain Summary:**  
**Based on forecast chart for noon 14 June, 2018**

A deep area of low pressure will bring a very windy day with widespread gales; storm-force winds over the hills of Scotland and Northern England. Winds gradually easing during the afternoon; most significantly England and Wales. Showers affecting many areas; these frequent across western Scotland, but easing across southern areas.

**Headline for Snowdonia National Park**

Severe gales in morning easing PM. Isolated showers. Low cloud lifting.

## Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 14 June, 2018

<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>	Southwesterly, soon veering westerly, 45 to 65mph in morning, easing to 25-35mph during the afternoon, later 20mph.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	<b>Expect significant buffeting across the hills for many hours in morning. Walking difficult in morning on higher areas with significant wind chill. Conditions easing into the afternoon.</b>
<b>How wet?</b>	<b>Early rain clearing; then largely dry</b> The legacy of overnight rain at dawn, mainly across eastern hills, will soon clear leaving a few drizzly showers; these mainly in the west. However few, if any, showers by the afternoon.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Extensive at first; lifting and clearing</b> Widely shrouding the hills at first, often to low levels in the west. However, the cloud base will lift through the morning, with breaks forming to 600-800m by late morning, or higher east Wales. Into the afternoon, many hills clearing; although a few patches may linger across higher slopes in the west above 800m.
<b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>20% at first; lifting to 70% into the afternoon.</b>
<b>Sunshine and air clarity?</b>	Glimpses of sun, especially in the east.  Visibility poor at first, but progressively improving and becoming very good.
<b>How Cold? (at 900m)</b>	7 to 9C.
<b>Freezing Level</b>	Above the summits.

## Snowdonia National Park - Looking Ahead

	Friday 15 June	Saturday 16 June
<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b> <b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	Southwest backing southerly later, around 20mph, but may strengthen to 25-30mph by dusk. <b>Fairly small most of the day.</b>	Southwesterly 15-25mph; strongest in the morning when locally 30mph higher tops. <b>May impede walking at times across higher slopes, mainly morning.</b>
<b>How wet?</b>	<b>Largely dry</b> Most or all day dry. Small chance an isolated passing shower inland by afternoon. Risk of rain developing from the west into the night.	<b>Bursts of rain, some heavy</b> Showery rain will spread in from the west to give rain 'on and off, through much of the day, before easing away in the evening.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>  <b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>Breaks to most tops</b>  Most cloud confined above 700m by mid-morning, and clearing most higher summits by afternoon, or perhaps sooner east Wales.  <b>70%</b>	<b>Morning fog lifting to higher tops</b>  Low cloud will shroud the hills from dawn, perhaps fairly extensively down to lower slopes, before lifting into the afternoon. Some hills will become clear of cloud. However, it may well linger across higher tops, and some may reform to lower slopes where rain persists for an hour or so.  <b>40%</b>
<b>Sunshine and air clarity?</b>	Patchwork of sun, although cloud tending to fill in.  Visibility mostly very good.	Mainly overcast; a few bursts of weak sun possible now and again.  Visibility generally poor, but improving from the west in the afternoon.
<b>How Cold? (at 900m)</b>  <b>Freezing Level</b>	7 to 9C.  Above the summits.	5 rising to 8C  Above the summits.

**Planning Outlook****All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 15 June, 2018**

Changeable conditions over the next week or so as frontal systems come in from the Atlantic. Spells of rain, most persistent on western mountains, accompanied by low cloud. Rain tending to focus on western Scotland next week, whilst England, Wales and the eastern Highlands should see just small amounts. Winds varied, but at times blustery, some days up to gale force on the mountains. Temperatures close to average, but cooler than recent times for many, particularly western Scotland.
