



General Summary for Friday, 15 June, 2018



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 15 June, 2018

A general southwesterly flow will bring showery rain to the Highlands, most frequent in the west. A few showers England & Wales, but often dry. Breezy on higher areas, but winds considerably lighter than Thursday.

Headline for Snowdonia National Park

Generally dry and bright. Wind fairly light.

Detailed Forecast for Friday, 15 June, 2018

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwest backing southerly later, 15 to 20mph. Strengthening to 30-35mph, locally 40mph Snowdon range into the night.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small.
How wet?	Largely dry Most or all day dry. Small chance an isolated passing shower inland by afternoon. Rain then developing from the west into the night.
Cloud on the hills?	Breaks to most tops Most cloud confined above 700m by mid-morning, and clearing most higher summits by afternoon, or perhaps sooner east Wales.
Chance of cloud free summits?	70%
Sunshine and air clarity?	Patchwork of sun, although cloud tending to fill in. Visibility mostly very good.
How Cold? (at 900m)	7 to 9C.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Snowdonia National Park - Looking Ahead

	Saturday 16 June	Sunday 17 June
How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 15-25mph; strongest in the morning when locally 30mph higher tops.	Southwesterly, 15 to 25mph, tending to strengthen toward evening.
Effect of wind on you?	May impede walking at times across higher slopes, mainly morning.	Fairly small most of the day.
How wet?	Bursts of rain, some heavy Showery rain will spread in from the west from dawn to give rain 'on and off, through much of the day, although tending to fade from coastal hills, and generally easing away elsewhere by late afternoon or evening.	Risk patchy rain west Most or all day may well stay dry, particularly east Wales. However, a risk that patchy rain drifts onto western hills around Snowdon from time to time, mostly toward evening.
Cloud on the hills?	Morning fog lifting to higher tops Low cloud will shroud the hills from dawn, perhaps fairly extensively down to lower slopes, before lifting into the afternoon. Some hills will become clear of cloud. However, it may well linger across higher tops, and some may reform to lower slopes where rain persists.	May linger western hills Banks of cloud on many higher areas in the morning, locally patches to lower slopes. Breaks forming to 800m or above, especially in east. Cloud lowering in west in rain.
Chance of cloud free summits?	40%	60%
Sunshine and air clarity?	Mainly overcast; a few bursts of sun possible now and again by afternoon. Visibility generally poor, but improving from the west in the afternoon.	Occasional sunshine, but skies may be often cloudy, especially by afternoon. Visibility very good most of the day.
How Cold? (at 900m)	5 rising to 8C	7 rising to 10C.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.	Above the summits

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 16 June, 2018**

Conditions remaining mixed into next week as frontal systems continue to come in from the Atlantic. Spells of rain, most persistent on western mountains in Scotland, accompanied by low cloud. Meanwhile, England, Wales and the eastern Highlands should see just small amounts of rain. Winds varied, but at times blustery, some days up to gale force on the mountains. Temperatures close to average, but cooler than recent weeks overall, particularly western Scotland.
