


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General Summary for Wednesday, 13 June, 2018



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 13 June, 2018

Fronts moving in from the west will push rain into W & NW Scotland, becoming persistent and heavy later. SE Scotland, plus England & Wales will stay substantially dry until sunset. Southwesterly winds will strengthen, reaching gale force later, then severe upland gales overnight.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Rain developing from west later. Upland gales by evening.

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 13 June, 2018

<p>How windy? (On the Munros)</p> <p>Effect of wind on you?</p>	<p>South to southwesterly; strengthening from the west: 15-20mph at first, 25mph by midday, then 35-45mph by mid-afternoon onward, and 50-60mph toward dusk and overnight.</p> <p>Starting small, but walking increasingly arduous later afternoon and more especially evening when locally difficult higher slopes.</p>
<p>How wet?</p>	<p>Largely dry until evening; occasional patchy rain</p> <p>Other than a few patches of drizzle around dawn, it will be dry much of the day. However, local patches of rain may occur from the middle of the day onward. Heavier rain will develop across Perthshire toward evening and into the night, becoming more widespread.</p>
<p>Cloud on the hills?</p> <p>Chance of cloud free Munros?</p>	<p>Extensive at first; but clearing by midday</p> <p>Banks of cloud fairly extensive at various levels from dawn; often from lowest slopes up. This cloud will likely linger for much of the morning; although it will tend to lift and break and, by early afternoon, clear the hills.</p> <p>30% morning; 70% afternoon</p>
<p>Sunshine and air clarity?</p>	<p>A patchwork of sun, although high cloud building from the west by the middle of the day. Visibility becoming very good by middle of day.</p>
<p>How Cold? (at 900m)</p> <p>Freezing Level</p>	<p>7 to 9C</p> <p>Above the summits.</p>

How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	Southwest changing abruptly westerly; in the range 45 to 60mph, risk 70mph for a few hours. Easing only slightly later. Walking difficult on higher areas most of the day. Considerable buffeting from lower slopes up. Significant wind chill.	Southwest backing southerly later, 20 to 25mph. Fairly small.
How wet?	Rain on and off Overnight rain should move through, but showers coming in from the west may be frequent over a few hours, occasionally heavy; possible sleet high tops.	A few showers Frequently dry, but a risk of rain from time to time. Some heavy bursts locally, these spreading increasingly from the south-west in the afternoon.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive, base lifting Widely shrouding the mountains at first, patches to low levels. Cloud base tending to lift through the day, with breaks often above 800 to 1000m, or higher in east PM.	Breaks most frequent east Most cloud confined above 700 to 900m, with breaks forming to most higher tops. Cloud often above the hills east of the A9. Patches forming below 700m around rain.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	60%	70%
Sunshine and air clarity?	Glimpses of sun, mostly east. Visibility very good at times, but reduced significantly by rain.	Patchwork of sun, although cloud tending to fill in. Visibility mostly very good, briefly reduced by rain.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	8C or higher at first, but soon likely dropping toward 4 or 5C. Above the summits, but dropping close to highest tops.	4 rising to 7C. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 14 June, 2018**

Changeable conditions over the next week or so as frontal systems come in from the Atlantic. Spells of rain, most persistent on western mountains, accompanied by low cloud. Rain tending to focus on western Scotland next week, whilst England, Wales and the eastern Highlands should see just small amounts. Winds varied, but at times blustery, some days up to gale force on the mountains. Temperatures close to average, but cooler than recent times for many, particularly western Scotland.

Forecast issued at 16:24 on Tuesday, 12 June, 2018
