

Southeastern Highlands


Hills accessed from Callander, Loch Tay and Loch Rannoch areas. Areas east of Loch Ericht, and south of Dalwhinnie, upper Glen Feshie and the River Dee (includes southernmost Cairngorm NP).



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General Summary for Friday, 15 June, 2018



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 15 June, 2018

A general southwesterly flow will bring showery rain to the Highlands, most frequent in the west. A few showers England & Wales, but often dry. Breezy on higher areas, but winds considerably lighter than Thursday.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Occasional showers. Many tops often clear. Wind easing.

Detailed Forecast for Friday, 15 June, 2018

How windy? (On the Munros)	Southwest backing southerly later, 20 to 25mph, easing to 15mph or less later in day.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small.
How wet?	A few showers, some heavy bursts, most widely afternoon Frequently dry morning, but a risk of a few showers locally from dawn. Some heavy bursts developing, these spreading increasingly from the south-west by afternoon, becoming locally frequent over an hour or more.
Cloud on the hills?	Breaks most frequent east Most cloud confined above 700 to 900m, with breaks forming to most higher tops. Cloud often above the hills east of the A9. Patches forming below 700m around rain.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	70%
Sunshine and air clarity?	Patchwork of sun, although cloud tending to fill in. Visibility mostly very good, briefly reduced by rain.
How Cold? (at 900m)	4 rising to 7C.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

	Saturday 16 June	Sunday 17 June
How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	Variable in direction, mostly southeasterly; often 5 to 10mph or less, perhaps 15 to 20mph briefly. Mostly negligible	Southwesterly, strengthening slowly through day, from 10mph or less at dawn, to 20-30mph by evening, strongest west. Fairly small most of the day.
How wet?	Showers, risk locally persistent rain Bursts of rain spreading from the south-west post dawn. Risk clusters of showers then becoming persistent in some areas for a few hours by the middle of the day onward; locally heavy with a risk of thunder.	Little or no rain Dry most or all day. Small risk a brief shower. Greatest chance of rain will be on hills in Perthshire toward dusk.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free Munros?	Morning fog lifting to higher tops Low cloud will shroud the hills from dawn, perhaps fairly extensively down to lower slopes, before lifting towards midday. Many hills will then become clear of cloud. However, in some areas cloud may persist above 900-1000m, and patches may reform to lower slopes in showers. 50%	Clearing higher tops Patches of cloud above 700 to 800m, or locally lower in the morning, but will lift and break, clearing most higher summits by middle of the day. 70%
Sunshine and air clarity?	Intermittent sunshine breaking through by midday. Visibility generally poor in morning, improving by afternoon.	Occasional sunshine breaking through in morning, then clouding over afternoon. Visibility very good most of the day.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	5 lifting to around 8C Above the summits.	6 rising to 9C, or locally slightly warmer east from Glenshee. Above the summits

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 16 June, 2018**

Conditions remaining mixed into next week as frontal systems continue to come in from the Atlantic. Spells of rain, most persistent on western mountains in Scotland, accompanied by low cloud. Meanwhile, England, Wales and the eastern Highlands should see just small amounts of rain. Winds varied, but at times blustery, some days up to gale force on the mountains. Temperatures close to average, but cooler than recent weeks overall, particularly western Scotland.

Forecast issued at 16:26 on Thursday, 14 June, 2018
