


Southeastern Highlands

Hills accessed from Callander, Loch Tay and Loch Rannoch areas. Areas east of Loch Ericht, and south of Dalwhinnie, upper Glen Feshie and the River Dee (includes southernmost Cairngorm NP).



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General Summary for Saturday, 11 August, 2018



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 11 August, 2018

Fine with little wind almost all day almost all of Scotland under a ridge of high pressure. From the south across Wales and later N England and by dusk S Scotland, windier, increasingly wet and foggy.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Fine; little wind and very clear air. Starting to deteriorate evening.

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 11 August, 2018

How windy? (On the Munros)	West backing south to southeasterly, 10mph, although strengthening toward 20mph during evening.
Effect of wind on you?	Negligible most of daylight
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain very unlikely Risk rain spreading from south to reach areas south of Perth from about dusk.
Cloud on the hills?	Hills substantially cloud free Summits free of cloud most or all daylight.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	Almost certain by late morning
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sunshine in and out, although cloud will tend to fill in. Visibility excellent.
How Cold? (at 900m)	5 rising to 10C
Freezing Level	Above the summits

How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	Low confidence in this forecast. East veering southerly. Initially up to 30-40mph but from south easing to 15mph Mostly small; although expect considerable buffeting from lower slopes up for a few hours morning N Perthshire and Angus.	Westerly 10 to perhaps 20mph afternoon onwards. Small
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Widespread rain; clearing slowly A band of rain will move slowly north, heaviest near and east of Glenshee. The rain may well have cleared or soon clear south of Perth, and slowly a transition to isolated showers will extend to all areas.	Showers Generally only showers, these isolated most of morning before becoming more widespread afternoon.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free Munros?	Blanket fog slowly clearing Fog very likely across the hills, widely forming on lower slopes, particularly near and east of Glenshee. Slowly from south, as rain clears, a marked transition as the cloud breaks up almost completely, although a few patches returning to higher slopes near showers. 30%	Extensive on higher areas Fog will shroud highest areas extensively after dawn; typically above 750 to 1000m, highest east of the A9. The base will tend to rise, by afternoon, west of the A9, most cloud above 1050m, whilst elsewhere, tops rarely covered. 60%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchwork of sunshine will extend northwards following clearance of rain. Frequently excellent visibility following clearance of rain.	Occasional sunshine only. Excellent visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	10 to 13C, warmest afternoon. Above the summits.	11C Above the summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 12 August, 2018**

Colder and wetter countryside over the next week or so. Rain (either as periods of constant rain or just showers) likely at some stage on several days, although some days dry. Cloud will often shroud higher tops, particularly western mountains in the mornings.
