

### General Summary for Saturday, 15 September, 2018



#### British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 15 September, 2018

For most mountain areas something of a lull for a while before gales develop towards or soon after dusk. Cold enough for snow at first in showers over highest tops in Scotland. After initially rising, threat of cloud bases falling over ranges near Irish Sea later in the day.

#### Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Sunny spells, few showers, wet and windy evening

### Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 15 September, 2018

<b>How windy? (On the Munros)</b>	West backing southwesterly 20-25mph. Will strengthen evening; upland gales overnight.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	<b>Fairly small - but walking becoming difficult after dark.</b>
<b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Risk showers</b> One or two brief showers, most likely west of A9 - of wet snow on highest tops. Threat of rain becoming extensive west of A9 toward evening, then a wet night.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Shrouding higher tops frequently</b> Cloud base dropping below 800m temporarily near showers. Otherwise, by late morning, most cloud above 1050m west of A9 and above the tops elsewhere. Will tend to lower again toward evening, perhaps widely below 600m west of A9.
<b>Chance of cloud free Munros?</b>	<b>60%</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchwork of sunshine, although in afternoon sheet of high level cloud will thicken. Excellent visibility.
<b>How Cold? (at 900m)</b>	3C post dawn; rising toward 6C.
<b>Freezing Level</b>	1200m post dawn, above the summits by midday. Widespread frost in glens at dawn.

## Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

	<b>Sunday 16 September</b>	<b>Monday 17 September</b>
<b>How windy? (On the Munros)</b> <b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	Southwesterly 45 to perhaps 60mph post dawn. Will ease by midday to 35 to 45mph and to 30mph by evening. <b>Walking widely difficult where exposed on higher areas, especially morning. Significant wind chill.</b>	Southwesterly backing more southerly and increasing from 25 to around 40mph by dusk and further overnight. <b>Fairly small until late morning; then increasing amounts of buffeting with likelihood of difficult walking conditions in the evening.</b>
<b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Rain on and off</b> Drizzly rain from time to time, the rain mostly near and west of A9. The rain will become isolated through the afternoon.	<b>Bursts of rain mainly west</b> Mostly dry in the morning. Bursts of rain for a while mainly western west of A93 midday and afternoon.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Very extensive</b> Fog across the hills most or all day; typically base 400 to 600m west of A9, although a little higher afternoon. By afternoon, cloud base will have risen markedly: a few patches below 900m but most cloud above 1200m.	<b>Mainly western ranges</b> Tops may clear for a while but cloud but patches in afternoon to below 400m in west though generally more broken to rather higher levels further east.
<b>Chance of cloud free Munros?</b>	<b>40%</b>	<b>40%</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	Little or no sun. Hazy; visibility sometimes poor in rain.	Best of sunshine Angus; perhaps only glimpses west of A9. Visibility very good or excellent away from rain.
<b>How Cold? (at 900m)</b> <b>Freezing Level</b>	6C.  Above the summits.	4 rising to 8C  Above summits

**Planning Outlook****All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 16 September, 2018**

Generally rather cold and unsettled with rain focused onto northwestern ranges. Remains of hurricane Helene threaten to bring very strong winds, a brief appreciable rise of temperatures and locally heavy rain quickly northwards around Monday night and into Tuesday. Showers or longer spells of rain likely across many area at some time on Tuesday and/or Wednesday. Further ahead there appears to be a trend towards higher pressure with a good chance of a significant rise in temperatures for a while. Still a chance of a spell of wet and windy weather in north and west around Friday.
