

Brecon Beacons

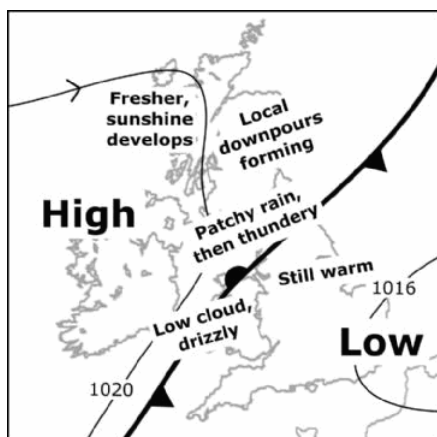
Includes all higher summits in the southern half of Wales: the Bannau Brycheiniog / Brecon Beacons National Park, southern Cambrian Mountains and highest Preseli hills.



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General Summary for Tuesday, 1 July, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 1 July, 2025

Cooler for Scotland and northern England. Patchy rain and low cloud across central-southern Scotland and northern England, risk of developing into slow-moving heavy downpours into the afternoon. Low cloud and a little rain for Wales. West & northwest Scotland better, cloud lifting to give sunshine near the coast. Mostly light winds.

Headline for Brecon Beacons

Low cloud west, clearer east. Mostly light wind.

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 1 July, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 10 to 15mph, toward evening reaching northwesterly 20mph on high tops.
Effect of wind on you?	Small, starting to feel breezier and cooler later.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Largely dry Possibly fine drizzle in morning where in cloud western Cambrians to Preseli hills. Small risk an isolated shower forming.
Cloud on the hills?	Low cloud persistent west until later, breaks eastwards Low cloud / fog widely in western areas, to lower slopes near Cardigan Bay, mostly above 600m further eastwards. Lifting and breaking in east, but cloud banks persist in west into afternoon; toward evening, largely all breaking up.
Chance of cloud free summits?	10% west; 30% east rising to 60%, later in day widely 80%.
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly cloudy, some glimpses of sun inland and toward east. Hazy or misty around many hills, most of day near west coast. May improve late in day with some sun and very good visibility developing in west.
How Cold? (at 750m)	11 to 14C, warmest toward east, small variation all day, still quite humid; feeling fresher by evening.

Cloud on the hills?	Little if any Rare if any patches briefly on high tops in morning.	Little if any Rare if any brief patches on tops in morning.
Chance of cloud free summits?	90%	Above 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchwork of cloud and sun; increasingly sunny near coast then inland afternoon. Visibility excellent.	Patchwork of cloud and sun, becoming sunnier west Wales afternoon. Visibility excellent.
How Cold? (at 750m)	10 to 12C.	9C rising to 12C east and southern hills.
Freezing Level	Above the summits	Above the summits

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 2 July, 2025

Fresher westerly air into midweek. Some heavy showers forming, mostly in eastern Scotland and Pennine areas - with light winds some slow-moving heavy downpours, possible thunder locally. By Thursday, west to southwesterly winds increase for Scotland, with more persistent rain and low cloud returning from the west associated with fronts over the Atlantic. Friday brings a risk of heavier rain to western Scotland and gales over higher terrain for Scotland and possibly northern England, rain extending further south with time. The weekend looks unsettled with low pressure bringing heavy showery rain widely, risk isolated thunder.
