

Brecon Beacons

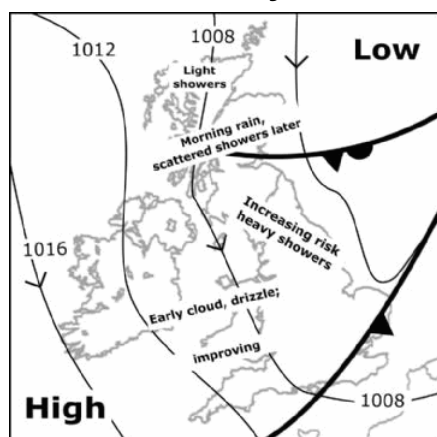
Includes all higher summits in the southern half of Wales: the Bannau Brycheiniog / Brecon Beacons National Park, southern Cambrian Mountains and highest Preseli hills.



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General Summary for Sunday, 6 July, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 6 July, 2025

Cloud on higher hills with patchy rain for many areas in the morning. Later, a band of showers forms from central highlands southward into England, drifting down the Pennines; showers will give heavy bursts with a risk of few lightning flashes southern Scotland. Damp in Wales early, gradually improving.

Headline for Brecon Beacons

Morning rain slowly fades; cloud lifting, best eastern tops

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 6 July, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Northwesterly 25mph with occasional stronger breezes; westerly early in the day. Increasing after dark, risk up to 35mph over high tops with some stronger gusts.
Effect of wind on you?	Walking impeded much of the day, increasingly uncomfortable into evening with buffeting gusts - stability may be challenged. Feeling cool.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Showers, mostly west Often raining in the morning, breaking into light showers drifting onto western slopes through much of the day, most frequent onto western Cambrians. May be drizzly and damp on high tops at times.
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive, improving; best of breaks to tops east Fairly extensive over high terrain early. Becoming patchy in nature and lifting with breaks to top, most frequent in the east. Westernmost slopes may see fog fill in on high terrain at times.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20%, rising to 80% east
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Glimpses or patchy sun, though high cloud may fill in at times. Visibility becoming good as cloud clears.
How Cold? (at 750m)	10 or 11C, rising only slightly if at all. Feeling at or near freezing in strongest winds as night falls.

	Monday 7 July	Tuesday 8 July
How windy? (On the summits)	Northwesterly 25-35mph, risk up to 40mph at dawn. Becoming gusty into evening.	Northerly 25mph at dawn, easing to a northwesterly 15mph, gusty later in the day.
Effect of wind on you?	Walking impeded in strongest wind, buffeting gusts may challenge stability. Feeling cool.	Fairly small much of the day, some uncomfortable wind in the morning.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Morning showers fade Few showers drift onto western slopes and the Cambrians, risk of some showery bursts east in the morning. Fading for a dry afternoon.	No rain expected
Cloud on the hills?	Tops soon cloud-free Banks drift over high tops on western mountains, notably the Cambrians. Lifting through morning to clear the tops, only fleeting caps over highest tops remain.	Hills cloud-free after morning Patchy cloud drifts around high tops early, lifting through morning and clearing summits.
Chance of cloud free summits?	90%	Above 90% most of the day
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchy sun becoming fairly extensive. Very good visibility through some haze.	Extensive morning sunshine, high cloud gradually building through afternoon. Excellent visibility.
How Cold? (at 750m) Freezing Level	7C rising to 10C, locally warmer on easternmost hills. Feeling like 3C in the wind. Above the summits	8C rising to 11C, up to 13C easternmost hills. Above the summits

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 7 July, 2025

A generally settled start to the week as high pressure will become dominant across England and Wales Monday and Tuesday. Expect substantially dry conditions here through much of the week with good periods of sunshine. In Scotland, low pressure to the north will facilitate a consistent west-southwesterly wind, driving several weak fronts onto northwestern coasts as the week goes - often cloudy here with periods of rain, tending to be drier with sunny spells in east Scotland. Temperatures will be near average. Some uncertainty about next weekend - fronts are likely to continue drifting towards Scotland and north England, though possibly interrupted by dry and warm air from the continent.
