

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General Summary for Wednesday, 9 July, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 9 July, 2025

Extensive cloud and drizzle near the all western coasts; improving in the afternoon when only a few patches remain, most extensive on the Cuillin where it will also be windy. Cloud base higher well inland with occasional breaks; clearing Peak District and parts of Wales. Feeling cool in Scotland and mild in England and Wales.

Morning cloud clearing. Light winds.

How windy? (On the summits)	West to northwesterly 10 to 15mph or less with variable direction wind.		
Effect of wind on you?	Small.		
How wet?	Rain unlikely		
(Precipitation and its impact)	Fine drizzle possible on western slopes in low cloud in morning.		
Cloud on the hills?	Early low cloud, largely clearing		
	Banks of cloud particularly western hills, may cover Cambrians and Preseli hills to 400m or lower in morning. Lifting and breaking up to leave most or all hills clear into afternoon. Some fog near coast. Patchy cloud may linger in mid-Wales.		
Chance of cloud free summits?	30% rising to 80% afternoon.		
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Fairly cloudy morning, occasional sun into middle of day, increasingly sunnier. Misty coastal hills particularly in morning; visibility becoming very good.		
How Cold? (at 750m)	13C rising to 17C, humid. Feeling a touch cooler in the wind.

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly or variable 10mph or less.	Light winds with variable direction. Risk southerly 15mph near Cardigan Bay.
Effect of wind on you?	Negligible.	Negligible, small near the west coast.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No rain expected	Very likely dry Remote risk of isolated late-afternoon thundery showers. Dry otherwise.
Cloud on the hills?	Hills clear Any early patchy mist or cloud around slopes soon dispersing.	Little or no cloud Very small chance of patchy cloud on higher ground should there be afternoon showers.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Practically certain	90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly sunny. Visibility very good.	Widespread sunshine; beware sunburn and dehydration. Excellent visibility near west coast; some haze eastern Cymru/Wales.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 10 July, 2025

A humid southwesterly wind midweek produces extensive low cloud across west and northwest Scotland with some drizzly rain. Drier with sun and broken cloud in eastern Scotland, improving in southern areas. High pressure expanding over England and Wales brings more sunshine and draws in increasingly very warm air again in the later part of this week; higher temperatures and more sunshine extending into Scotland with time. A fine and very warm weekend in prospect, low risk of thundery showers forming toward the west. Cooler with a greater risk of showers early next week.
