

Brecon Beacons

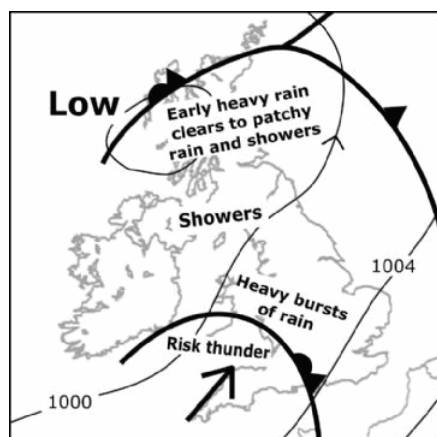
Includes all higher summits in the southern half of Wales: the Bannau Brycheiniog / Brecon Beacons National Park, southern Cambrian Mountains and highest Preseli hills.



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General Summary for Monday, 10 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 10 November, 2025

Heavy rain for much of the Highlands from dawn into the morning, moving northwards, clearing to leave patchy rain, local showers in west; cloud base rising. Some showery rain in the Lakes, drier Pennines. Showers in Wales merging into clusters of heavy rain. Moderate to locally gusty southerly winds.

Headline for Brecon Beacons

Gusty winds. Rain and heavy showery bursts become frequent.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 10 November, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	South to southwesterly 15 to 25mph, speeds likely to vary, at times gusty 30mph over higher terrain.
Effect of wind on you?	Feeling noticeably blustery at times on exposed higher terrain; may start to affect comfortable walking; marked wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Heavy showery bursts, chance thunder Patchy showery rain at first developing into clusters of heavier showers, some bursts with hail, chance of isolated thunder into middle of day and afternoon. Rain remains on and off into afternoon.
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive, lowest in rain Shrouding the hills most or all day, some occasional breaks where dry in mid-Wales, but lowering extensively in rain above 400-600m.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Rare glimpses of sun mostly morning. Visibility good for a time when dry, but poor during rain.
How Cold? (at 750m)	5 or 6C. Feeling below freezing if exposed to wind, nearer -5C at times on high tops.

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Southerly, strengthening rapidly overnight up to dawn, 45 to 60mph all day, gusts becoming often 70mph high tops. Difficult walking conditions higher terrain, powerful gusts knocking you off your feet. Marked wind chill despite mild air.	South-southwesterly 20-30mph, tending to strengthen, risk later in day and into evening 40mph. Possibly fairly small for a time, but risk increasingly blustery, becoming more challenging with time.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain and drizzle, heavier later Several hours of constant rain from dawn, heavy west and south, may then fade to lighter rain and drizzle, but later likely prolonged heavier rain setting in again from the west, ongoing into evening.	Risk rain setting in heavier again Very wet underfoot with streams in spate and flooding following previous rain. Possibly only patchy rain or drizzle early in day, but risk rain soon setting in again, sustained heavy rain returning.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive, lowest south Blanket low cloud across the hills, from lower slopes up in southern areas. Highest bases to 500-600m eastern mid Wales.	Extensive Likely to shroud the hills all day, to lower elevations southern areas. Some higher bases for a time mid-Wales, but blanketing all hills widely to low levels during rain.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Below 10%	10%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast and murky.	Overcast, misty in most areas, increasingly murky and dull, poor visibility in constant rain.
How Cold? (at 750m) Freezing Level	Rising from before dawn to 6C, soon up to 9C; only small fall with height. Feeling like -5C directly in the wind. Above the summits	9C. Feeling like 0C or below if in stronger wind. Above the summits

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 11 November, 2025**

Unsettled south-southwesterlies through midweek, periods of heavy rain widespread, further flooding for Wales, the Lakes and southwest Scotland. Mountain gales on Tuesday for England, Wales, S & E Scotland. Cooler than recently in Scotland, but still generally mild England and Wales by day and night.

Later in the week, colder air pushes into Scotland, dropping below freezing over the mountains, with some snow over higher terrain in the Highlands on Thursday-Friday; strong to gale force easterly winds develop widely. Colder northeasterly air is expected to become more widespread into the weekend and next week.

Forecast issued at 16:00 on Sunday, 9 November, 2025
