

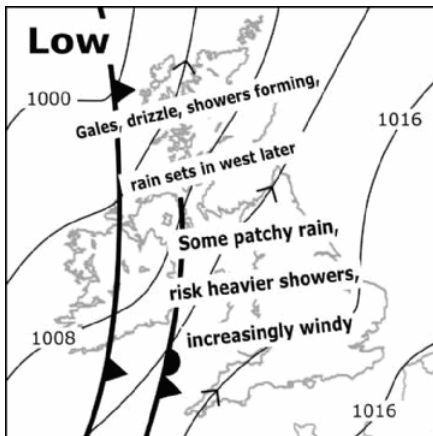
Brecon Beacons

Includes all higher summits in the southern half of Wales: the Bannau Brycheiniog / Brecon Beacons National Park, southern Cambrian Mountains and highest Preseli hills.



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General Summary for Saturday, 27 June, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 27 June, 2026

Widely windy, afternoon gales across Scotland, possibly Lakeland and Snowdonia too. In Scotland, drizzle gives way to showery rain, setting in late in the day over western hills. Patchy rain England and Wales with dry windows and warm sunny moments, but a rising risk of showery bursts through afternoon, locally heavy.

Headline for Brecon Beacons

Windy, notably west; mostly dry, later risk of heavy showers

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 27 June, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	South-southwesterly 20-35mph, always strongest westernmost hills where may further strengthen for a few afternoon hours.
Effect of wind on you?	Blustery over high terrain, buffeting gusts making walking uncomfortable in places, and walking may be more steadily strenuous over high western terrain for periods.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Some patchy rain, often dry Some patchy rain drifting from the southwest from time to time, but lengthy drier windows likely too. Rising risk sudden downpours with thunder and lightning later in the day.
Cloud on the hills?	Varied, likely clear of tops for at least several hours Patchy cloud banks, risk more extensive southwestern slopes early in day. Rising and breaking into middle of day, best east and mid Wales, and perhaps several hours of largely clear hills. In rain, banks return to higher terrain with some lower ragged patches.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Rising to 70% for several hours
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Occasional sun, then a more extended sunny spell through afternoon. Some mistiness in morning. Visibility often good, but turning poor should rain occur.
How Cold? (at 750m)	14 to 16C, typically warmest east where may reach up to 18C. Still rather humid. Feeling cooler directly in wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	West-southwesterly 20-25mph, occasionally gusting up to 30mph over tops; trending westerly later. Fairly small but gusts impacting ease of walking.	Generally westerly, some variability, 10-15mph and tending to ease. Small to negligible.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Morning rain, substantially dry afternoon From before dawn, several bands of rain pass west-to-east, brief heavier falls likely in the morning. From midday onward, largely dry, some risk of light spots of rain drifting onto western hills.	Some patchy rain and showers, mostly dry From dawn, a few spots of rain drifting onto western areas, amounting to little and more often widely dry. Some risk of pop-up afternoon showers.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Often clearing summits afternoon Fairly extensive through much of morning, to most middle slopes, or lower western slopes with ragged lower patches in the early morning. From noon, a rising and breaking trend, to likely just passing banks over high tops. 20%, rising afternoon to 70%	Lifting to largely above tops From dawn, variable banks of cloud at multiple elevations, the most extensive cloud on southwestern slopes. Through morning, lifting with breaks forming, likely largely above the summits afternoon, some caps returning if showers occur. 50% rising to 80%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly cloudy morning breaking into a patchwork of cloud and sun afternoon. Visibility becoming very good.	A patchwork of cloud and sunshine, some variable thin high cloud around. Very good visibility.
How Cold? (at 750m) Freezing Level	11 to 13C, warmest east. Slightly cooling later afternoon, 9 or 10C by evening. Above the summits.	10C rising to 13 or 14C. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 28 June, 2026**

Cooler on Sunday as the weather pattern returns to an Atlantic influence. Bands of rain sweep eastward early Sunday, followed by fresher, sunnier weather with some patchy showers in the north and west. This westerly Atlantic pattern dominates next week: high pressure south and low pressure north will bring alternating periods of rain punctuated by bright sunshine. Wind generally on the strong side with mild to sometimes warm temperatures, though cooler and windier spells at times produce significant wind chill on Scottish tops. Day-to-day detail currently uncertain, but western hill groups from Lakeland northward will see the most cloud and patchy rain, while east and southern areas likely drier and sunnier. This pattern is indicated to continue into the following weekend.
