

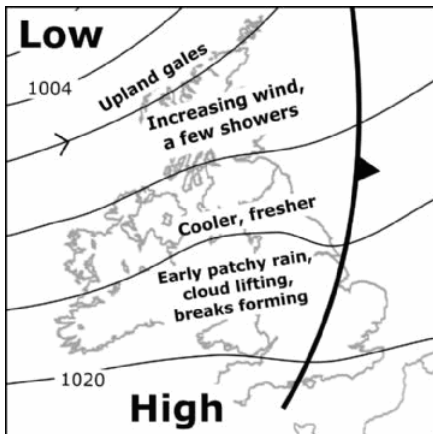
Brecon Beacons

Includes all higher summits in the southern half of Wales: the Bannau Brycheiniog / Brecon Beacons National Park, southern Cambrian Mountains and highest Preseli hills.



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General Summary for Sunday, 28 June, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 28 June, 2026

Strengthening southwesterly winds, reaching gale force over western Scottish mountains, soonest near Skye. Much fresher everywhere, rather chilly on tops in exposure to wind. Some early rain, improving as cloud lifts and breaks, but scattered showers move east across the Highlands into the afternoon.

Headline for Brecon Beacons

Breezy. Mostly dry, cloud lifts and breaks above tops.

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 28 June, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	West-southwesterly 20-25mph, occasionally gusting up to 30mph over tops, typically strongest around dawn, again toward evening; trending westerly later.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small but gusts impacting ease of walking occasionally on high tops. Feeling fresh.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Possible early showers, substantially dry From before dawn, some showery rain passes west-to-east, an odd heavier burst, but many places more often dry. From mid-morning on, largely dry, rare light spots of rain drifting onto western hills.
Cloud on the hills?	Lifting and breaking through morning Fairly extensive early morning, to most middle slopes, or lower briefly southwest areas. During morning, a rising and breaking trend, to likely just passing banks over high tops by middle of day onward, often clear hills.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20% at first, rising middle of day to 80%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly cloudy start breaking into a patchwork of cloud and sun. Visibility becoming very good.
How Cold? (at 750m)	11 to 13C, warmest east. Slightly cooling later afternoon, 9 or 10C by evening. Feeling like 5C in the breeze on tops.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Brecon Beacons - Looking Ahead

How windy? (On the summits)	Generally westerly, some variability, 10-15mph and tending to ease.	South then southwesterly, 20 to 25mph, occasional 30mph on high tops; later shifting westerly.
Effect of wind on you?	Small to negligible.	Feeling blustery and cool over higher mountains. In places gusts may affect balance on exposed terrain.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Some patchy rain and showers, mostly dry From dawn, a few spots of rain drifting onto western areas, amounting to little and more often widely dry. Some risk of pop-up afternoon showers.	Rain and showers, some heavy Patchy rain and showers throughout the day, risk more frequent for periods, some heavy bursts tending to drift eastwards, risk of isolated thunder. May tend to clear from west Wales later in day.
Cloud on the hills?	Lifting to largely above tops From dawn, variable banks of cloud at multiple elevations, the most extensive cloud on southwestern slopes. Through morning, lifting with breaks forming, largely above the summits afternoon, some caps returning if showers occur.	Fairly extensive Shrouding most high terrain all day, varying bases around rain, some ragged patches to lower slopes. Local breaks higher up mainly in eastern mid-Wales.
Chance of cloud free summits?	50% rising to 80%	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	A patchwork of cloud and sunshine, some variable thin high cloud around. Very good visibility.	Generally cloudy, a little weak sun mainly morning in east, then late in day west. Visibility often reduced by rain, poor for periods; intermittently very good if dry.
How Cold? (at 750m)	10C rising to 13 or 14C.	10 or 11C, little variation all day. Feeling close to 0C directly in the wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.	Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 29 June, 2026

A westerly Atlantic pattern dominates the new week: high pressure south and low pressure north will bring alternating periods of rain punctuated by bright sunshine. Wind generally on the strong side with mild to sometimes warm temperatures, though cooler and windier spells at times produce significant wind chill on Scottish tops. Western hill groups from Lakeland northward will see the most cloud and patchy rain, while east and southern areas likely drier and sunnier. This pattern is likely to continue into next weekend.
