

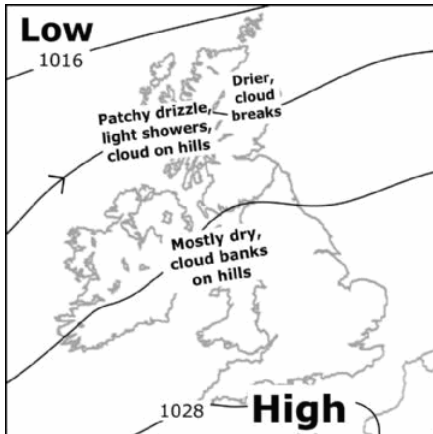
Brecon Beacons

Includes all higher summits in the southern half of Wales: the Bannau Brycheiniog / Brecon Beacons National Park, southern Cambrian Mountains and highest Preseli hills.



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General Summary for Monday, 29 June, 2026



British Mountain Summary:
Based on forecast chart for noon 29 June, 2026

Southwesterly breezes, strongest in the morning. Cloud covering many western hills, some drizzly rain and light showers, mostly western Scotland. Cloud higher and more broken toward east. Some improvements in the west as cloud base rises, some breaks forming afternoon. Rain develops from west into night.

Headline for Brecon Beacons

Breezy, easing. Often dry, low cloud tending to lift.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 29 June, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	West turning southwesterly, 20-25mph dawn to early morning, easing to 10-15mph by middle of day into afternoon, freshening a little from west, later southerly 20mph, or 25mph up to dusk in west.
Effect of wind on you?	Ease of walking impacted in exposure early, easing to fairly small effects. Later in day feeling more blustery in west.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Mostly dry, odd light spots From dawn, a few spots of rain drifting onto western areas, amounting to little and more often widely dry. Low chance of an isolated light shower afternoon. Later evening, some patchy rain mainly in west.
Cloud on the hills?	Lifting to largely above tops From dawn, variable banks of cloud at multiple elevations, the most extensive cloud on southwestern slopes. Through morning, lifting with breaks forming, largely above the summits afternoon.
Chance of cloud free summits?	50% rising to 80%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	A patchwork of cloud and sunshine, some variable thin high cloud around. Very good visibility.
How Cold? (at 750m)	10C rising to 13C afternoon. Feeling like 3C on high tops in strongest wind in morning.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Brecon Beacons - Looking Ahead

	Tuesday 30 June	Wednesday 1 July
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	South then southwesterly, 20 to 25mph, occasional 30mph on high tops; later shifting westerly. Feeling blustery and cool over higher mountains. In places gusts may affect balance on exposed terrain.	Westerly 15-20mph in morning, then strengthening southwesterly, to 25-30mph afternoon, later risk 40-45mph. Fairly small in the morning, but becoming more blustery, walking uncomfortable later, possibly arduous in exposure.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain and showers, some heavy Patchy rain and showers for much of the day, more frequent for periods in west, some heavy bursts tending to drift eastwards. Tending to clear from west Wales later in day.	Chance of rain late in day Generally dry much of the day, except for an odd isolated shower. Toward evening, possibility of patchy rain developing, may amount to very little.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Fairly extensive Shrouding most high terrain all day, varying bases around rain, some ragged patches to lower slopes. Local breaks higher up mainly in eastern mid-Wales. 20%	Varied in morning, mostly lifting Cloud banks mostly higher and western hills in the morning, may cover some mid slopes for a time. Lifting higher and breaking from most tops into afternoon. 30% rising to 80%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Generally cloudy, a little weak sun mainly morning in east, then late in day west. Visibility often reduced by rain, poor for periods; intermittently very good if dry.	Patchwork of cloud and sun, giving way to high cloud moving in from west later. Visibility excellent.
How Cold? (at 750m) Freezing Level	10 or 11C, little variation all day. Feeling close to 0C directly in the wind. Above the summits.	9 or 10C, little variation all day. Feeling near or possibly below freezing on high tops as wind increases later. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 30 June, 2026**

A changeable westerly Atlantic pattern dominates this week. Western hill groups from Lakeland northward will see the most cloud and rain, while east and southern areas are drier and sunnier. A spell of stronger winds and more widespread rain likely develops later Wednesday to early Thursday. Possibly another windy and wetter spell into Friday. A rather cool and windy westerly pattern is likely to continue into next weekend with showery rain. Drier and warmer conditions are indicated into the week of 5th July, though southwesterlies may still bring more cloud to the west, some rain in northwest Scotland.
