

Brecon Beacons

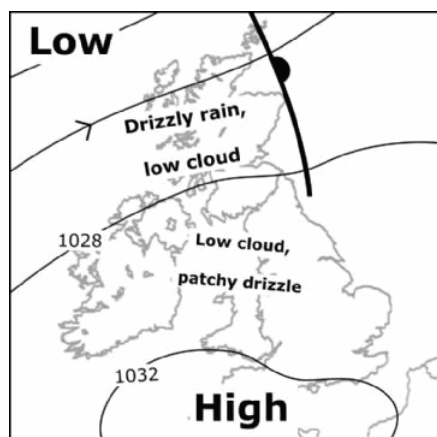
Includes all higher summits in the southern half of Wales: the Bannau Brycheiniog / Brecon Beacons National Park, southern Cambrian Mountains and highest Preseli hills.



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General Summary for Monday, 21 September, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 21 September, 2026

Warm and humid air across the country brings low cloud shrouding hills extensively, foggy to some lower elevations in the west. Some rain moves east across Scotland then generally damp air with fairly persistent drizzle over western hills. Strongest winds toward northern Scotland, gusty not just on highest tops.

Headline for Brecon Beacons

Fairly light wind; drizzle, low cloud most persistent west.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 21 September, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 15-20mph in morning, locally gusty, easing to 10-15mph or less.
Effect of wind on you?	Breezy for a time, but becoming mostly small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Local drizzle west Some fine drizzle where in cloud, mostly western Cambrians and Pembrokeshire; mostly dry toward east Wales.
Cloud on the hills?	Low cloud most persistent west and southwestern hills Blanket cloud shrouding many hills, fog from low-mid elevations up in the morning toward southwest, but for a few hours more east-mid Wales may be fully clear for a time, and cloud remaining patchy where it does form. Through afternoon, base lifting a little and some breaks forming, but western hills likely stay shrouded.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20% west, to 50% east.
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Some sun mostly in east Wales and in morning. Misty poor visibility much of day southwestern hills, some variable improvements inland and east.
How Cold? (at 750m)	13 to 15C, little change into night; quite humid.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Brecon Beacons - Looking Ahead

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	South to southwesterly 10 to 15mph or less. Small.	Southwesterly 10-15mph, trending northwesterly 20-25mph, may further strengthen briefly. Fairly small, but speed and direction will vary, and quite blustery over the tops for a time afternoon.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Damp air mostly west Fine drizzle where in cloud and on some lower slopes too toward west Wales. More often dry eastern areas.	Drizzly and patchy rain, clearing afternoon Some drizzle on the high tops and patchy rain around in the morning. Rain may be more frequent for a few hours, but breaking up and moving east afternoon, to become dry later.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Fairly extensive, lifting higher Low cloud from many lower hill slopes upward and some fog banks into valleys too in the morning. Cloud tending to drift higher up and breaks forming gradually, soonest in east. Banks of cloud likely linger all day on south/western aspects. 20%	Often covering high terrain, breaking afternoon Often cloudy above 600m through morning, some variability, and more extensive for a time, with ragged patches forming to forest canopies. Through afternoon, bases lift, increasingly breaking up, just banks over tops later if any. 30%, later rising to 70%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy, misty or hazy; glimpses of sun breaking through in places, mainly eastern valleys; some improvement during the day.	Glimpses of sun, breaking out afternoon, for a mostly clear sunset. Very good visibility out of cloud/rain.
How Cold? (at 750m) Freezing Level	12 to 14C, humid; little change into evening and night. Above the summits.	Steady around 12 or 13C into afternoon, then cooling to finish around 9C. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 22 September, 2026**

Rain affects western Scotland on Tuesday, patchier rain extending eastward. Then into Wednesday, a heavier swathe of rain moves east, more likely over England & Wales, clearing from the west leaving a few showers. South-southwesterly winds increase again on Thursday and rain may move into western Scotland, but elsewhere is likely dry. A variable outlook continues into next weekend and just beyond with high pressure building from the south at times with fairly warm and dry conditions, but some Atlantic systems still pass to the north bringing occasional rain and showers toward western Scotland at least. A trend toward drier conditions more widely around the change of month.
