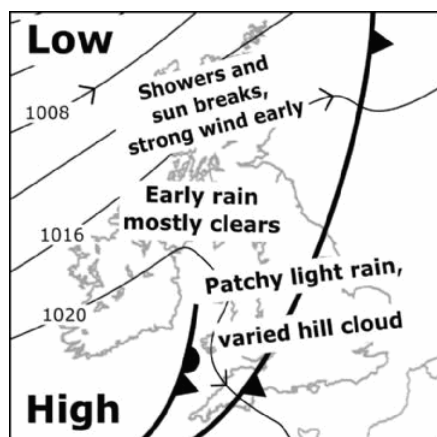

General Summary for Friday, 25 September, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 25 September, 2026

Windy in Scotland, showers west, only scattered eastward where often sunny; wind lessens for a time afternoon. Patchy rain England and Wales, tending to break up in north England later. Rain and cloud linger in Wales and south Pennines but rainfall totals small; mild-to-warm, little wind in Wales.

Headline for Brecon Beacons

Patchy rain and varied hill cloud most of the day

Detailed Forecast for Friday, 25 September, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly or variable 10-15mph or less, but at dawn 20mph and rising a little again toward evening.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Some light rain A few bands of rain will drift east across the hills through the day, generally light and patchy in nature. Some risk of some steadier falls, any heavier moments brief.
Cloud on the hills?	Tops largely covered, variably lower Cloud base will vary through the day, most terrain above 800m often shrouded, a few odd breaks above summits away from rain, but some broader banks returning lower as well, perhaps extensively above 600-700m during rain. Late in the day, may more substantially break up.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	A few windows of weak patchy sun, but cloudier moments as well. Good visibility out of cloud and rain, more varied on high terrain.
How Cold? (at 750m)	12C well into the day, but beginning to cool from the west, to finish around 9 or 10C.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

	Saturday 26 September	Sunday 27 September
How windy? (On the summits)	West turning southwesterly 10 to 20mph, typically strongest west Wales.	A gusty southerly 25-40mph, a sudden westerly shift and lessening later, 20-25mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small.	Strenuous moments in exposure, strongest gusts affecting balance with notable wind chill despite mild air.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Little or no rain Substantially dry, an odd brief light shower mainly west Wales.	Heavy rain for a time afternoon Mostly dry early, some light rain beginning to approach from the south and west. Rain becomes frequent, setting in for several hours, a swathe of heavy rain briefly. Breaking up later.
Cloud on the hills?	Little if any Patchy mist some valleys at first, some brief fragments may drift upslope, but soon all cloud above hills.	Increasingly covering high terrain Little to start, then ragged patches lowering onto western tops, increasingly spreading east, lowering more widely afternoon to cover most high terrain, bases locally to 400-500m southern slopes during heaviest rain.
Chance of cloud free summits?	90%	80% lowering to 30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sunshine and well broken cloud. Visibility very good, slight haze toward west coast.	Sunny start, patchy cloud building, overcast for much of the afternoon. Very good visibility, deteriorating with cloud/rain.
How Cold? (at 750m)	8C rising to 11C afternoon.	9C rising to 13C, notably cooling into night. Feeling like 1 to 3C in strongest wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.	Above the summits.

All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 26 September, 2026

South to southwesterly winds prevail onward into the weekend and next week. Saturday will be bright for many, windy in Scotland with some showers in the west. Mild-to-warm temperatures, but a chilly feeling north in wind. A band of rain sweeps eastward more broadly on Sunday; rain could be very heavy for a few afternoon hours. A window of higher pressure is indicated for Monday with warmer, brighter conditions for many, but northwest Scotland starts breezy with cloud and some light rain. Into mid-next week, risk of a more widespread gale, or severe gale over higher mountains. Detail of timing is uncertain, but several bands of rain punctuated by showers and bright spells will likely cross most mountain areas. Unseasonably warm temperatures. The weather stays mixed into early October.
