

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General Summary for Saturday, 16 August, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 16 August, 2025

An increasingly fine, sunny and warm day as early low cloud breaks up - some places may take much of the morning to improve, and locally fine drizzle is possible for a time, mainly eastern areas. Light winds overall, an easterly breeze for Wales

Headline for Cairngorms NP and Monadhliath

Low cloud clearing, warm sun increasingly; light wind.

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 16 August, 2025

How windy? (On the Munros)	Direction varied; almost calm on some summits, rarely more than 10mph.	
Effect of wind on you?	Negligible	
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain very unlikely Risk isolated fine drizzle morning. East of about Braemar low chance of a heavier shower in the afternoon.	
Cloud on the hills?	Very extensive morning, but clearing Varied after dawn: Patchy or extensive fog valleys and lower slopes after dawn, and also areas of cloud higher up. Will improve, by late morning as nearly all cloud lifts above the summits.	
Chance of cloud free Munros?	30% rising above 90% by middle of day	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Cloud breaking slowly later morning to widespread bright sunshine. Excellent or superb visibility once the fog and mist clears.	
How Cold? (at 900m)	Ranging between 6 and 10C after dawn to 12 to 17C afternoon, generally warmest S Cairngorms NP west toward Ben Alder.

How Cold? (at 900m)	11C post dawn; as high as 19C mid to late afternoon.	14C from dawn, small rise, but some slopes rising to 18C afternoon, less likely in east.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 17 August, 2025

High pressure dominates most or all next week, becoming centred toward the north. Easterly breezes prevailing over England, Wales and southern Scotland, gusty for periods. Extensively dry, warm and sunny, although sometimes low cloud will affect more eastern mountains. Some early morning fog, hills warmer than most valleys at dawn. In southwest Wales, small chance of a local showery burst of rain early in the new week. The final week of August suggests some breakdown to the settled weather, but timing of any change is very uncertain.

Very dry again underfoot with significant fire risk.
