



General Summary for Sunday, 6 July, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 6 July, 2025

Cloud on higher hills with patchy rain for many areas in the morning. Later, a band of showers forms from central highlands southward into England, drifting down the Pennines; showers will give heavy bursts with a risk of few lightning flashes southern Scotland. Damp in Wales early, gradually improving.

Headline for Lake District

Spotty rain, showers later with heavy bursts

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 6 July, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	West turning northwesterly 15-20mph. Shifting northerly through afternoon and variable but gusty speeds around rain; may drop to low speeds for a time later.		
Effect of wind on you?	Comfortable walking affected at times, notably on exposed ridges. Risk rapid changes in speed and direction late in the day; stability may be challenged in sudden gusts. Feeling cool.		
How wet?	w wet? Morning showers and drizzly rain, risk of heavy bursts later		
(Precipitation and its impact)	Morning showers fade into spots of drizzly rain, notably from Pillar towards Skiddaw for a time. Showers return later in the day, risk heavy, possibly an odd flash of lightning.		
Cloud on the hills?	Intermittent over high terrain, improving		
	Intermittent banks of cloud from 700m upward morning into afternoon, lower bases on coastal-facing slopes. Tops southeast of Scafell Pike may briefly clear. More often clear later afternoon, banks mostly isolated to higher tops, patches lower in showers.		
Chance of cloud free summits?	Becoming 70%		
Sunshine?	Glimpses of sun, may improve somewhat later.		
Air clarity (below cloud)	Visibility intermittently poor, better later.		
How Cold? (at 750m)	8C rising to 11C.

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Northwesterly 25mph, at times up to 30mph on west coastal-facing slopes. Strengthening later, up to 35-40mph. Walking impeded in strongest wind, becoming more strenuous with buffeting gusts later. Feeling cool.	Northwesterly 20-25mph. Gradually shifting westerly and easing to 15-20mph, some gusts over high fells. Some impeding winds in the morning will ease for fairly small impact.
How wet?	Little rain expected	Little rain expected
(Precipitation and its impact)	Risk of a few odd showers later in the day; may be entirely dry.	Chance local spots of drizzly rain late in the day.
Cloud on the hills?	Lifting off high terrain through morning	Tops largely clear until late
	Patchy banks drift over highest fells in the morning, locally drifting slightly down slopes facing the Solway. Lifting for largely clear summits.	Cloud caps over high fells, some banks drifting down north and western aspects. Lifting to clear most fells by midday. As evening approaches, patches intermittently return to tops, possibly briefly filling in across most high terrain.
Chance of cloud free summits?	90%	Above 90%, reducing to 70% late
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchy sun soon becomes fairly extensive, some fair weather cloud around. Very good visibility, some haze west fells.	Morning sunshine gradually weakened by building high cloud, quite cloudy later. Excellent visibility.
How Cold? (at 750m)	7C rising to 11C. Feeling like 3C in strongest wind.	7C rising to 11C

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 7 July, 2025

A generally settled start to the week as high pressure will become dominant across England and Wales Monday and Tuesday. Expect substantially dry conditions here through much of the week with good periods of sunshine. In Scotland, low pressure to the north will facilitate a consistent west-southwesterly wind, driving several weak fronts onto northwestern coasts as the week goes - often cloudy here with periods of rain, tending to be drier with sunny spells in east Scotland. Temperatures will be near average. Some uncertainty about next weekend - fronts are likely to continue drifting towards Scotland and north England, though possibly interrupted by dry and warm air from the continent.
