
The entire Lake District National Park, taking in all major summits, including Scafell, Helvellyn, Skiddaw, the Langdales and Old Man of Coniston.





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# General Summary for Wednesday, 9 July, 2025



# British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 9 July, 2025

Extensive cloud and drizzle near the all western coasts; improving in the afternoon when only a few patches remain, most extensive on the Cuillin where it will also be windy. Cloud base higher well inland with occasional breaks; clearing Peak District and parts of Wales. Feeling cool in Scotland and mild in England and Wales.

Morning drizzle fading; clouds tending to break

## Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 9 July, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 15 to 20mph, occasional 25mph on highest tops early morning in the northern fells.	
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small.	
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Drizzly rain mostly morning  Drizzle or patchy light rain in the morning.  Tending to fade, but leaving fine drizzle where in cloud in the west, making rock surfaces slippery.	
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive, some improvement  Shrouding fells widely in morning, bases 400-600m, lowest in west, to some lower slopes near coast for a time. Base rising a little, breaks forming soonest in east, but likely to linger over higher western fells.	
Chance of cloud free summits?	10% rising to 40%	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy, glimpses of sun developing mostly east/southeastern areas.  Misty especially coastal hills in morning; visibility becoming good below cloud.	
How Cold? (at 750m)	11C rising to 14C afternoon, humid. Feeling a touch cooler in the wind.

Chance of cloud free summits?	20% rising to 50% west, 80% east.	90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy morning, misty in places. Some sun breaking through. Visibility increasingly very good.	Widespread sunshine through thin high-level cloud; beware sunburn and dehydration. Excellent visibility; hazy over the Irish Sea.
How Cold? (at 750m)	13C rising to 17C.	18C in the afternoon.

## **Planning Outlook**

### All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 10 July, 2025

A humid southwesterly wind midweek produces extensive low cloud across west and northwest Scotland with some drizzly rain. Drier with sun and broken cloud in eastern Scotland, improving in southern areas. High pressure expanding over England and Wales brings more sunshine and draws in increasingly very warm air again in the later part of this week; higher temperatures and more sunshine extending into Scotland with time. A fine and very warm weekend in prospect, low risk of thundery showers forming toward the west. Cooler with a greater risk of showers early next week.
