
The entire Lake District National Park, taking in all major summits, including Scafell, Helvellyn, Skiddaw, the Langdales and Old Man of Coniston.





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General Summary for Monday, 10 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 10 November, 2025

Heavy rain for much of the Highlands from dawn into the morning, moving northwards, clearing to leave patchy rain, local showers in west; cloud base rising. Some showery rain in the Lakes, drier Pennines. Showers in Wales merging into clusters of heavy rain. Moderate to locally gusty southerly winds.

Headline for Lake District

Brisk winds. Low cloud and local showery rain; better north.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 10 November, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southerly 25 to 30mph, strongest more often on western fells.	
Effect of wind on you?	Feeling noticeably blustery on exposed higher terrain, starting to affect comfortable walking; marked wind chill.	
How wet?	Often dry, some showers	
(Precipitation and its impact)	Bursts of rain around or before dawn tending to ease, but occasional light showery rain drifts onto coastal hills for a few hours, fading. Often dry many inland/north areas. Toward dusk, possible bursts of rain returning.	
Cloud on the hills?	Mostly southern tops, breaks north	
	Banks of cloud mostly over southern areas in the morning, where likely to linger on higher terrain. Rising and breaking toward many upper slopes further north.	
Chance of cloud free summits?	30% south, 60% north.

Air clarity (below cloud)	Visibility very good away from patchy cloud.	
How Cold? (at 750m)	5 or 6C. Feeling below freezing if exposed to wind, nearer -5C on higher tops.

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Lake District - Looking Ahead

How windy? (On the summits)	Southerly, strengthening rapidly from before dawn to 40 to 50mph in morning, reaching 60mph with stronger gusts.	Southwestery 25-35mph or stronger before dawn, easing gradually to 20mph, turning southerly; may increase into night.
Effect of wind on you?	Soon arduous walking conditions, increasingly difficult mobility over higher terrain. Marked wind chill despite mild air.	Blustery, affecting comfortable walking on higher areas in the morning, tending to lessen during daytime.
How wet?	Rain all day, often heavy	Local drizzle, more rain by evening
(Precipitation and its impact)	Rain widespread throughout the day, sustained heavy falls likely, particularly southwestern areas. Streams in spate, renewed flooding.	Very wet underfoot with streams in spate and flooding following previous rain. Pockets of drizzle mainly south Lakes, but much of daytime substantially dry. Evening onward, risk further heavy rain.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive, lowest south	Most persistent low cloud south
	Blanket low cloud across the fells, from lower slopes upward south and southwest areas, 500-600m further northeast across Lakeland.	Banks of cloud from lower elevations upward in the morning, remaining most persistent over southern fells. Some breaks toward north Lakes.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Below 10%	20% S/SW, to 40% N Lakes.
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast and murky, better visibility locally toward north Lakes if drier.	Mostly cloudy, some weak sun mainly northeast Lakes. Misty areas may linger, but some local good visibility mainly north and east.
How Cold? (at 750m)	5C soon rising from dawn to 7C, reaching 9C from noon; only small fall with height. Feeling nearer -5C directly in the wind.	8C. Feeling like 0C or below if in stronger wind.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 11 November, 2025

Unsettled south-southwesterlies through midweek, periods of heavy rain widespread, further flooding for Wales, the Lakes and southwest Scotland. Mountain gales on Tuesday for England, Wales, S & E Scotland. Cooler than recently in Scotland, but still generally mild England and Wales by day and night.

Later in the week, colder air pushes into Scotland, dropping below freezing over the mountains, with some snow over higher terrain in the Highlands on Thursday-Friday; strong to gale force easterly winds develop widely. Colder northeasterly air is expected to become more widespread into the weekend and next week.
