








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General Summary for Friday, 14 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 14 November, 2025

Cold across Scotland and northern England, below freezing on Scottish mountains all day. Snow flurries toward north/east Highlands. Significant chill factor from strengthening easterly winds, gale-force all day southern Scotland and northern England. Severe gales and incessant heavy rain Wales and Peak District.

Headline for Lake District

Gales, severe gusts. Patchy rain, amounts mostly small.

Detailed Forecast for Friday, 14 November, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Easterly, 40 to 55mph, powerful gusts through high passes and downslope toward west; into evening 60mph+.	
Effect of wind on you?	Arduous conditions over the fells, buffeting gusts could knock you over, not just on highest ground. Significant wind chill.	
How wet? (Precipitation and its	A little rain at times Spots of rain in the wind occasionally, possible sleet high tops.	
impact)	Some steadier light rain early morning, and may come and go in southernmost areas. Very wet underfoot after previous rain.	
Cloud on the hills?	Covering some higher tops	
	Cloud banks most frequent above 700-800m toward eastern Lakes, mostly above 800m further west, with breaks above tops. Lower cloud anywhere rain occurs.	
Chance of cloud free summits?	40%	
Sunshine?	? Overcast skies, dull particularly toward south.	
Air clarity (below cloud)	Slight haze, visibility poor in places in rain.	
How Cold? (at 750m)	1 or 2C. Wind shill feeling like 10 to 15C

Freezing Level	Close to freezing point on higher slopes above 800m.

Lake District - Looking Ahead

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Easterly 50mph from dawn, powerful gusts downslope to west. Slowly decreasing, to 30mph afternoon, less Difficult walking, turbulent gusts on some slopes particularly in morning, lessening, but remaining blustery afternoon.	Northeasterly later northerly, 20mph, at times gusty 25mph higher fells and around some high passes. Prepare for noticeable wind chill over higher terrain; fairly small effect on walking, more blustery in a few spots.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Small amounts occasionally in the wind	Dry overall
	Rain from overnight in south and eastern areas tending to ease off into the morning, leaving spots in the wind mostly over eastern fells, largely dry further west and northwards.	Low chance of a brief light shower.
Cloud on the hills?	Patches some tops, mostly little	Capping some tops, likely clearing
	Occasional cloud banks drifting onto higher slopes, mainly eastern fells above 700-800m, but many tops likely often clear.	Cloud banks likely to drift over some higher slopes in the morning, most likely Skiddaw group around to Helvellyn, tending to lift and break to leave most cloud above tops.
Chance of cloud free summits?	70%	50% rising to 80%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sun mostly obscured by varied high cloud, generally overcast skies. Visibility good, though some haze likely.	Some sunshine breaking through, but fairly cloudy. Visibility excellent.
How Cold? (at 750m)	2C. Wind chill feeling like -15C in morning, -10C afternoon.	1 or 2C. Feeling like -5C in exposure to wind.
Freezing Level	900m in morning, tending to rise just above freezing on tops.	Frost in sheltered valleys from dawn. Staying near to freezing on higher fells above 800-900m all day.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 15 November, 2025

Colder air extends to all areas, staying below freezing over higher mountains most likely throughout the next week to 10 days. In the short-term, for Wales and south Pennines expect ongoing flooding from high rainfall on Friday, the rain eases into Saturday here. A lot of dry weather for Scotland this weekend, but some snow flurries move in from the north on Sunday. Areas of showery snow over the hills into next week coming in on often strong northerly winds, gale force into midweek. Snow most frequent toward north of the Highlands with some locally more substantial accumulations over higher terrain; some accumulating upland snow possible more widely during Tuesday as a front drifts southward.
