

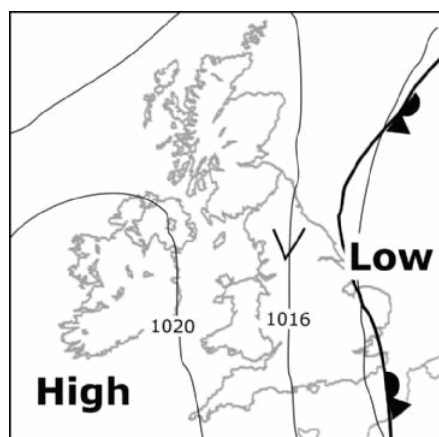
Lake District

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General Summary for Tuesday, 25 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 25 November, 2025

Higher areas, mainly Scottish Highlands frozen, and frost some valleys at first.

Otherwise, benign as from the west the northerly wind drops and snow and hail showers become isolated.

Headline for Lake District

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 25 November, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Northerly 20-25mph at first, strongest eastern fells. Gradually easing to 15mph through the day.
Effect of wind on you?	Becoming small - though notable wind chill in the morning.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No precipitation
Cloud on the hills?	Varied; some higher tops clearing, others remaining in cloud. Generally, cloud base 800m or above.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Greater than 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Bright sunshine, most widely south lakes. The air very clear so excellent visibility, but fog some valleys and higher slopes.
How Cold? (at 750m)	1C
Freezing Level	850m, rising slowly through day. Frost many valleys morning.

Lake District - Looking Ahead

	Wednesday 26 November	Thursday 27 November
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Southwesterly soon 40 to 50mph. Extensively difficult walking where exposed with sudden powerful gusts and significant wind chill.	South to southwesterly, strengthening through morning and quickly with height to 50mph where exposed on higher tops. Significant wind chill and walking difficult. Where exposed on higher areas, general mobility becoming a struggle.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain and drizzle on and off Rain and drizzle gradually spreading inland later morning, possibly middle of day (sleet highest tops temporarily). The rain heaviest and very frequent south lakes and western fells elsewhere; total rainfall small elsewhere.	Frequent rain and drizzle Rain and drizzle most of the day. Least wet northern and northeastern fells, where intermittent.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Fells filling in with fog; lowest base south and west Some higher slopes may initially be cloud free. Will deteriorate, across south lakes and western fells elsewhere, cloud widely below 300-450m. Elsewhere, slowly filling in across higher slopes, typically 500 to 700m afternoon. Dropping to less than 10%	Mountains persistently foggy. Persistent cloud from 200 to 450m although cloud base up to 650m at times north lakes. Almost nil
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Glimpses of weak sunshine lower slopes north lakes; becoming extensively dull and misty as visibility drops in rain.	Rare glimpses of weak sun lower slopes north lakes. Visibility widely poor, hazy at best.
How Cold? (at 750m) Freezing Level	1C rising to 5C through daylight. Will feel as cold as minus 12C directly in the wind. Locally 900m at first; rising above the summits, probably during morning. Frost many valleys at dawn.	8C. Will feel as cold as minus 6C directly in the wind. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 26 November, 2025

A long series of Atlantic lows passing north of or across Britain will bring high rainfall to western mountains together with frequent upland gales (sometimes storm force) and low cloud. Temperatures on higher tops sometimes below freezing point, particularly at the weekend in Scotland, but elsewhere fresh snow transient.
