

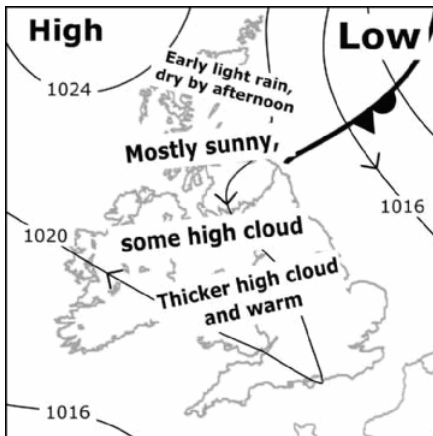

General Summary for Sunday, 14 June, 2026



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 14 June, 2026

Some early drizzle and patchy light rain in northern Scotland fades by afternoon. Elsewhere dry all day and often sunny though some high cloud weakening sun in places; sun may be more patchy east Scotland and later northern England. Warm southern Pennines and Wales. Light wind, though starting blustery in east Scotland.

Headline for Lake District

Mostly sunny and mild, some periods of patchier sun

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 14 June, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Northwesterly 15-20mph at dawn, soon shifting northerly and easing to 10-15mph, later largely 10mph and often less with a northeasterly shift.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small, though some gustiness over the summits in the early hours.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No rain expected
Cloud on the hills?	Likely clearing all summits May be fairly extensive above 700-800m at dawn, varied lower banks; clearest hills near Windermere to start. Bases lift through morning, the fells likely clear afternoon, an odd fleeting cap over Scafell.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Rising to 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Often sunny though weakened by high cloud, some thicker patchy cloud around early and late in the day. Very good visibility.
How Cold? (at 750m)	6C rising to 10 or 11C.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	South-southeasterly 10mph at dawn, gradually strengthening, finishing 20-25mph. Small most of the day, but an inconvenient breeze developing in exposure later.	Southerly 15mph early, rising to 20-25mph, gusting 30mph over high tops, later gusts approaching 35-40mph. Fairly small, but increasingly blustery, strenuous walking in exposure later with a notable wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Patchy rain later The morning is dry, then risk of patchy rain approaching from the southwest afternoon, falls light with continued dry windows. Falls becoming more frequent late in the day.	Patchy rain, may set in Occasional patchy rain from time to time, notably early, but often dry well into the day. Becoming more frequent, and risk setting in for several hours towards evening with heavy falls on south and west fells.
Cloud on the hills?	Little or none until later Some ragged cloud at various heights in the morning, soon dissipating for clear fells well into the day. A rising risk of cloud banks forming over the tops through later afternoon.	Fairly extensive The fells shrouded to at least middle slopes through the morning hours, to lower slopes south and west fells. A rising trend with some breaks through afternoon to the northeast; high summits unlikely to clear. Returning extensively later.
Chance of cloud free summits?	90%	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly sunny morning, high cloud slowly building through afternoon. Very good visibility.	Mostly cloudy, a few brighter moments afternoon to the north and east. Very good visibility where out of cloud, largely poor on high summits.
How Cold? (at 750m) Freezing Level	9C rising to 11 or 12C. Above the summits.	9 to 11C. Feeling near freezing in direct wind. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 15 June, 2026**

Through Monday, cloud will return from the southwest and bring some patchy rain with it. From Tuesday onward, a variable southwesterly will dominate through at least mid-week. Windy at times with periods of rain, drizzle and low cloud most persistent in the west; Tuesday into Wednesday is likely a wetter and unsettled period, with the unsettled weather lingering well into Wednesday in Scotland. Warmest in England and Wales, but may stay cooler in Scotland as low pressure to the northwest recycles air from the north Atlantic back onto the Munros. Pressure generally trending higher later in the week, centred southeast of England, but low pressure to the west of Ireland will prevent any extended settled periods with more windy, wet weather at times next weekend; temperatures likely become more widely warm.
