
# The Northwest Highlands

Areas north from Knoydart in the west, and the Great Glen towards the east (NB. Does not include Mull and areas west of Loch Linnhe, these are found in the West Highlands forecast.)



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## General Summary for Thursday, 27 March, 2025



## British Mountain Summary:

#### Based on forecast chart for noon 27 March, 2025

Widespread upland severe gales and rain across Scotland - although breaks in the rain some eastern and far northern areas (sometimes snow higher tops far north). South into England and Wales, less windy, particularly morning and away from hills open to the sea to the southwest, very little if any rain.

#### Headline for The Northwest Highlands

Upland severe gales. Rain setting in increasingly widely.

## Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 27 March, 2025

How windy? (On the Munros)	Southwesterly 45 to 55mph, particularly afternoon when 60mph near Skye and higher mountains elsewhere.
Effect of wind on you?	Challenging conditions, balance often affected on higher terrain, frequent considerable buffeting. Significant wind chill.
How wet?	Rain most of the day, sleet tops at times
(Precipitation and its impact)	Morning: A lull following overnight rain, although near Skye may well continue at least intermittently. Afternoon: Increasingly wet; often heavy near Skye, less so elsewhere. Mainly far north, precipitation intermittently snow above 900-1050m.
Cloud on the hills?	Increasingly extensive
	Near Skye - as far inland as Kintail: Persistent fog, rare breaks above 500m. Elsewhere: cloud base often 600 to 900m, but tending to lower as rain sets in afternoon.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	Almost nil near Skye; 40% later 20% elsewhere
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Any weak patchy sun giving way to thickening cloud. Visibility persistently poor near Skye and in rain elsewhere; otherwise hazy.
How Cold? (at 900m)	0C at times mainly Sutherland; otherwise 2C. Feeling like -15C where exposed to the wind.
Freezing Level	900m at times, mainly Sutherland; otherwise 1100m or above.
