
# The Northwest Highlands

# General Summary for Sunday, 31 August, 2025



# British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 31 August, 2025

Low pressure southwest of the Hebrides, brings strong to gale force southerly winds; marked chill. Showery rain frequent on western hills from west Highlands to Snowdonia, with showers increasingly developing elsewhere. Hill fog varied, but extensive west/southern Highlands. Highest cloud bases in northern Scotland.

## **Headline for The Northwest Highlands**

Southerly gales, significant chill. Rain and hill fog west and south. Best in the north.

# **Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 31 August, 2025**

How windy? (On the Munros)	Southerly, 35 to 50mph, strongest west; on Skye and nearby coastal mountains often 50-60mph, local stronger gusts.	
Effect of wind on you?	Arduous walking conditions widely, often difficult mobility on western mountains, gusts could knock you over. Significant wind chill.	
How wet?	Showery rain in south/west, drier in north.	
(Precipitation and its impact)	Frequent showery rain all day on Skye, a scattering of showers developing elsewhere, heavy bursts mixed in mainly afternoon. Areas toward Ben Hope and Wyvis, will escape dry well into the day.	
Cloud on the hills?	oud on the hills? Persistent around Skye. Good breaks north and east.	
	Cloud base varying, but extensively shrouding western mountains above 600-800 during rain, some patches to lower slopes at times. Higher, more well broken, cloud bases further north and eastwards, toward Ben Hope and Wyvis, clearing for periods.	
Chance of cloud free Munros?	20% Skye, to 70% north/east.	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Brief glimpses of sun mostly north/east. General haze west, poor in rain; better visibility east.	
How Cold? (at 900m)	7 or 8C, little change all day. Wind chill feeling like -5C in exposure.

How windy? (On the Munros)	Southerly, 30 to 50mph, speed likely to vary, but strongest west coast and Skye, becoming west-southwesterly by dusk.	Southwesterly 25 to 30mph, strongest across northern hills in the morning when perhaps 35mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Frequent buffeting, strenuous walking over exposed high terrain, affecting balance on ridges. Difficult conditions west coast/Skye. Considerable wind	Blustery with a marked chill in the wind. Some buffeting, perhaps frequent for a time in the north.
How wet?	Heavy showers, hail and thunder	Frequent showery rain in the west
(Precipitation and its impact)	Frequent or more constant heavy rain much of the day around Skye. Elsewhere, driest in morning, but increasingly widely showery. Heavy bursts with hail, risk of lightning.	Areas of showery rain will be frequent across hills on and near Skye. Increasingly a scattering of showers into the north and east too, after dry start.
Cloud on the hills?	Most persistent around Skye, varied inland	Extensive on and near Skye.
	Often covering higher slopes of the Cuillin and nearby coastal mountains on the mainland above 600 to 800m. Further north and east, cloud more broken above 800m, sometimes clearing higher tops.	Hill fog extensive across higher slopes, and at times to mid slopes in rain, on and near Skye. Occasionally capping tops in the north and east.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	10% Skye, to 30% elsewhere.	30% on and near Skye. 60% elsewhere.
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Glimpses of sun mostly toward northern areas. General haze near Skye, but visibility very good below cloud inland.	Sunny glimpses will mostly be limited to northern and eastern hills. Visibility poor in rain in west, very good often in the north and east.
How Cold? (at 900m)	7 to 9C. Feeling sub-zero directly in the wind, near -5C high tops.	8 to 10C

## **Planning Outlook**

#### All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 1 September, 2025

Low pressure continues to dominate early in the new week, maintaining unsettled conditions widely. Areas of rain and heavy showers, risk of hail and thunder. Windy, gales over mountains early in the week, tending to ease for periods at least in the Highlands mid-late week, whilst southwesterlies often remain strong over England and Wales. Some improvement possible toward next weekend, though the extended outlook into the second week of September remains changeable. Mid-September shows signs of a better improvement as pressure tends to rise more widely.
