
The Northwest Highlands

General Summary for Thursday, 18 September, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 18 September, 2025

Strong upland wind or gales across the mountains. Frontal wave bringing persistent, heavy rain and extensive cloud from North Wales to the Southern Uplands. Highlands drier, especially east of A9, but showery near the west and north-west coast in the morning. Temperatures mild but with notable wind chill.

Headline for The Northwest Highlands

Upland gales, wet morning with extensive cloud

Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 18 September, 2025

How windy? (On the Munros)	Southwesterly 50 to 60mph in the morning. Easing a little in the afternoon to around 40mph, perhaps 30mph on Skye. Very gusty.	
Effect of wind on you?	Difficult walking conditions will make progress challenging initially. Very powerful gusts may easily blow you over. Easing to arduous conditions later. Significant wind chill.	
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Wet near the west coast, particularly morning Showery near the coast, especially Skye and nearby mainland in the morning where it may be heavy for a time; showers may merge to feel like persistent rain for a time. Clearing in the afternoon, last on Skye around mid-afternoon. Much drier near Ben Wyvis.	
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive morning, some breaks later	
	Extensive cloud down to lower west-coastal slopes in the morning. As weather dries in the afternoon, cloud base lifting and becoming more patchy. May clear lower northern summits, but higher summits likely to remain shrouded.	
Chance of cloud free Munros?	10% becoming 40%	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Little or no sun in many places, but patchy sunshine if out of rain in the afternoon. Poor visibility near the west coast.	
How Cold? (at 900m)	7C. Feeling around -5C in the wind.	
Freezing Level	Well above the summits.

(Precipitation and its impact)	A front passing northeastward brings rain widely for a time in the morning. Then showers on and off through the day near the west coast, may fade slowly. Small amounts reaching Ben Wyvis.	Some uncertainty: Likely infrequent light showers, falling as snow flurries on high ground in the afternoon. Risk of more persistent, heavier rain remains.
Cloud on the hills?	Widespread, lowest west	Widespread on high ground
	Cloud shrouding most higher ground, especially near the coast. Base will be lower during rain. Highest cloud base will be near Ben Wyvis, some breaks to 900m, but summits are unlikely to clear.	Widespread patchy cloud at various levels through the day. Should heavier rain arrive, these will merge, lower and become more extensive.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	20%	60%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Glimpses of weak sunshine at times. Poor visibility in rain, some improvements, at times very good toward east.	Little or no sunshine. Good visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m)	6C. Feeling below -5C in the wind.	2C, dropping a little through the day. Highest summits likely to be below freezing in the afternoon. Feeling -10C in the wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.	Above the summits in the morning, dropping to 1100-1000m by the afternoon.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 19 September, 2025

Weather remains mixed into and through the weekend, often with high winds, regions of persistent rain and extensive cloud. Temperatures falling through Saturday across the UK with the higher Scottish summits dropping below freezing and frosts in some glens. Looking increasingly likely that high pressure will take hold from the north on Sunday evening, bringing a period of more settled weather across the country for a couple of days at least, perhaps longer.

Forecast issued at 16:30 on Wednesday, 17 September, 2025
