


The Northwest Highlands

Areas north from Knoydart in the west, and the Great Glen towards the east (NB. Does not include Mull and areas west of Loch Linnhe, these are found in the West Highlands forecast.)



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General Summary for Saturday, 10 January, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 10 January, 2026

Most terrain frozen, snow cover over many hills, beware icy surfaces even lower down. Wind fairly light, but windy Scottish highlands. Some snow showers and flurries, the snow frequent W & NW Highlands where hills extensively foggy.

Headline for The Northwest Highlands

Snow; very frequent near Skye.

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 10 January, 2026

How windy? (On the Munros)	South turning southwesterly 30 to 40mph, strongest near the coast, particularly near precipitation. Strengthening rapidly later evening into the night to gales 50-70mph+.
Effect of wind on you?	Blustery, affecting balance exposed areas, locally walking difficult. Considerable wind chill. Deteriorating significantly into night.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Coastal showers, snow flurries move inland Showers most frequent near to west coasts, occasional snow flurries extending east at times, to lower slopes inland, but near coast mostly rain below 500m, some hail. Sometimes the precipitation constant near Skye.
Cloud on the hills?	Varied patches, more widely in showers Mountains extensively cloud covered above 450 to occasionally 650m near Skye and near west coast.cloud. Elsewhere, typical cloud base 600 to 800m, although some breaks easternmost areas to 1000m.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	10%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Glimpses of weak sun, best north/east. Visibility very good away from showers, but in places beware difficult navigation if in fog over snow cover.
How Cold? (at 900m)	-2C, nearer 0C coastal tops. Feeling like -10 to -13C if exposed to wind.
Freezing Level	Terrain widely frozen inland; just above freezing around 300-500m, up to 600-700m near west coast and on Skye.

The Northwest Highlands - Looking Ahead

	Sunday 11 January	Monday 12 January
How windy? (On the Munros)	Southerly, in range 45 to 60mph much of daytime, but risk 70-80mph early morning and likely again into the night.	South to southwesterly 50 to 70mph, may fluctuate during the day, risk 80mph for a few hours.
Effect of wind on you?	Difficult conditions over the mountains; frequent buffeting and powerful gusts to some lower slopes, significant wind chill.	Difficult conditions, any mobility challenging, frequent buffeting even lower elevations. Significant wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Snow soon turning to rain Snow and freezing rain starts overnight - may fall to lower slopes inland and east for a few hours. Into daytime, increasingly rain toward higher levels widely, heaviest near Skye. Very wet underfoot where snow melts.	Rain much of day west, snow high tops Frequent to constant precipitation most western mountains, often heavy Skye to Torridon; smaller amounts toward Ben Wyvis. Falling as snow above around 900-1000m. Very wet underfoot where snow melts.
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive Shrouding most higher terrain all day, to lower slopes on Skye and south-facing coastal slopes. Higher bases inland and northwards, some breaks toward tops.	Extensive, lowest west Covering the hills most or all day above 800m, often 500-600m south Cuillin and nearby coastal hills up to Torridon. Some higher bases at times east and northward.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	20%	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast and mostly dull. Visibility generally very poor, appalling early in day if in snow on tops.	Little or no sun. A general haze, particularly west; visibility very poor in precipitation.
How Cold? (at 900m)	-1C rising to +2 or 3C, small variation of temperature with height inland. Wind chill feeling like -15C.	1 or 2C. Wind chill feeling around -15C where directly exposed on tops.
Freezing Level	Much terrain frozen to lower slopes inland from dawn, 600-800m+ coasts; rising variably above freezing toward all tops.	Close to highest summits around 1000-1100m, but later in the day may drop further, more likely into the night.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 11 January, 2026

Thawing develops during Sunday, snow turning to rain, rising just above freezing toward highest tops in Scotland, whilst in England and Wales a more rapid and substantial thaw - beware unstable snowpack conditions, then becoming very wet underfoot where melting occurs. A complex and unsettled outlook next week, generally less cold than recently, but still often below freezing over Scottish mountains above 800-1000m, and at least intermittently below freezing over tops in England and Wales. A mix of snow and rain will fall, often snow on Scottish tops with fresh accumulations. Some showery days with hail. Wind will vary in speed and direction day-to-day, some lulls, but risk gales at times on hills.
