

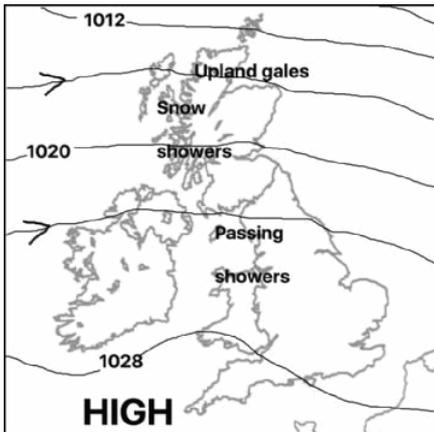
Peak District

General Summary for Sunday, 22 November, 2020



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 22 November, 2020

Gusty westerly winds, morning gales in the Highlands, will bring showers; although these will be mainly brief affairs away from W Scotland where showers will be more frequent. Snow above 500-600m in the Highlands. Flurries tops elsewhere. Cloud breaking above most tops, away from W Scotland.

Headline for Peak District

Blustery day with isolated showers. Hills mostly cloud free.

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 22 November, 2020

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly, 20 to 30mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Ease of walking impeded and significant wind chill where exposed on higher terrain.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Little or no rain Chance of occasional drizzly showers coming in from the west, mostly hills north from Manchester.
Cloud on the hills?	Little if any Most cloud generally above highest tops.
Chance of cloud free summits?	90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sun most common toward eastern moors. Visibility often very good.
Temperature (at 600m)	2 or 3C, but feeling closer to -5C where exposed to the strongest winds.
And in the valleys	5C rising to 8C.

Peak District - Looking Ahead

	Monday 23 November	Tuesday 24 November
How windy? (On the summits)	Southwest 10 to 15mph increasing to 25 to 35mph through the day.	Southwesterly in the range 30 to 45mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Walking becoming fairly arduous through the day with significant wind chill and buffeting developing.	Walking arduous across the hills with significant wind chill and buffeting.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Often dry, patches of rain at times. Often dry through the day, although at times spots of rain in the wind. However, risk of rain becoming more persistent across the hills later in the afternoon.	Periods of drizzly rain. Dry for periods, but times where shafts of drizzly rain will move across the areas; these may become frequent in the west later.
Cloud on the hills?	Occasional patches higher slopes. Good breaks likely though the day across the hills, but at times banks of cloud will roll in across higher tops above 500-600m. Perhaps more extensive later in afternoon.	Banks covering higher tops at times. Periods where hills are mostly clear, but banks of low cloud will come and go higher tops at times, mostly in and around the shafts of drizzle rain.
Chance of cloud free summits?	60%	60%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Often cloudy, some weak shafts of sun possible at times. Visibility mostly good.	Mostly cloudy, but rare shafts of sun possible. Visibility good at times, but becoming poor in drizzly rain.
Temperature (at 600m)	3C lifting to 6C	7C
And in the valleys	2 to 4C at dawn, lifting to 7 to 9C into the afternoon.	9 to 11C

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 23 November, 2020**

Next week, briefly higher temperatures on Monday, then most higher mountains of Britain likely to drop back below freezing for several days ahead. Precipitation remaining frequent throughout next week, focused on western mountains - sometimes snow or hail. Confidence of forecast detail becomes low later in the week, with some hints of higher pressure, but many indications staying unsettled.
