


Peak District

General Summary for Monday, 10 July, 2023



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 10 July, 2023

Scotland: Southerly or variable wind. Some early patchy rain near west coast. Scattered, slow-moving, showers forming, some afternoon downpours with the risk of local thunderstorms.

England and Wales: Blustery southerly wind. Heavy rain, with risk of thunderstorms, edging north through the day.

Headline for Peak District

Mostly dry start, but increasingly heavy, rain and downpours developing.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 10 July, 2023

How windy? (On the summits)	Southerly, speeds may vary, in the range 20 to 35mph, likely strongest afternoon onward.
Effect of wind on you?	Sometimes fairly small, but expect breezy conditions on higher terrain, may become very blustery and affect ease of walking.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Heavy bursts may set in, chance lightning Mostly dry in morning. Showers forming increasingly from middle of day, heavy bursts, merging into longer spells of rain advancing north and eastwards. Chance of isolated thunder and lightning.
Cloud on the hills?	Early patches, lowering in rain Varied extent of cloud, some patches on lower and middle slopes in the morning. Clearing above many tops for a time, but in heavy rain, cloud will lower extensively across the hills, patches to lower slopes.
Chance of cloud free summits?	60%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly cloudy, glimpses of sun. Visibility good for periods, but poor in rain.
Temperature (at 600m)	11C rising to 14C. Feeling like 3 to 6C directly in the wind.
And in the valleys	Around 10C at dawn, rising to 18 to 20C.

Peak District - Looking Ahead

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Southwest turning westerly, speeds may vary, typically 20 to 25mph, at times 30mph higher exposed tops. Blustery over higher exposed tops, buffeting in places, feeling cool.	Westerly 20 to 30mph Blustery conditions with noticeable chill over the tops in the wind.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Heavy bursts, risk lightning A few hours may be dry at first, but rain will soon become frequent. Heavy bursts on and off, may set in for periods; these drifting from west to east through the afternoon. Localised thunderstorms possible.	Clusters of showers, some downpours. Showery westerly pattern. Scattered showers, may merge at times should any troughs move in from west. Some downpours possible with risk thunder.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Covering tops for periods Varied banks of cloud across higher terrain, sometimes filling in extensively above 500m, plus ragged patches from lower elevations upward during/after heavier rain. 50%	Mostly above tops Cloud mostly above the tops, but some ragged patches possible in and around showers, and over western tops early in the morning. 80%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly cloudy, brief glimpses of sun mainly east, weak due to high cloud. Visibility locally good if dry, but hazy or misty for periods, poor conditions in rain.	Fairly cloudy, but some sun breaking through occasionally. Visibility generally very good, but poor where in rain.
Temperature (at 600m) And in the valleys	11C, little change all day. Directly in the wind, feeling like 3 to 5C on tops. 10 to 12C at dawn. Reaching 18 to 20C afternoon.	9C lifting to 11C Lifting to 17 to 19C

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 11 July, 2023

Staying unsettled through this week with low pressure dominant. Areas of rain and showers will affect all areas. Heavy bursts with a risk of thunderstorms. Temperatures on the cool side across the mountains. Wind speeds will vary, typically west or southwesterly, some lulls, but at times strong giving marked wind chill.

Indications favour unsettled weather continuing through next weekend into the start of the following week with low pressure close to Scotland. Unlikely to see any very warm weather returning in the next couple of weeks.
