

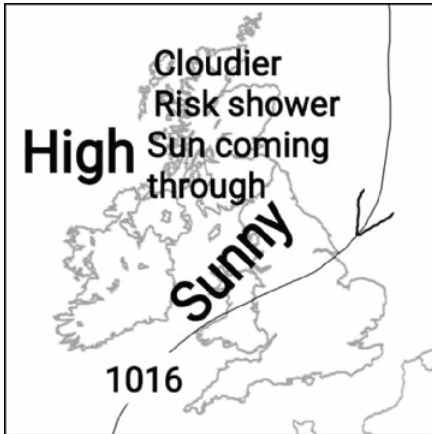
# Peak District

## General Summary for Sunday, 19 May, 2024



### British Mountain Summary:

#### Based on forecast chart for noon 19 May, 2024

Early areas of low cloud and fog will burn away through the morning to leave most mountains clear of cloud with periods of warm sunshine, most extensive for southwestern Scotland, as well as England and Wales. Cloud banks may persist for northern Scotland where it will be cooler. Risk isolated inland showers.

### Headline for Peak District

Fine with extensive sunshine and feeling warm. Beware sunburn and dehydration.

## Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 19 May, 2024

<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>	East to northeasterly, 15mph, may reach 20mph higher areas.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	Fairly small, but starting to feel cool toward evening on tops.
<b>How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)</b>	Rain not expected
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	Hills clear
<b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	Above 90%
<b>Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)</b>	Extensive sunshine and excellent visibility. A little fair-weather cloud may build.
<b>Temperature (at 600m)</b>	11C rising to 14C, but may start to drop cooler eastern moors later in day.
<b>And in the valleys</b>	7C at dawn, rising to 18 to 20C, warmest western areas.

## Peak District - Looking Ahead

	Monday 20 May	Tuesday 21 May
<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>	Easterly 15 to 20mph.	Easterly or variable 5 to 10mph.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	<b>Fairly small, but feeling rather cool on exposed higher terrain.</b>	<b>Negligible</b>
<b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Rain not expected</b>	<b>Risk scattered heavy showers afternoon.</b> Dry all morning, then an increasing risk of some showers developing, perhaps some with some potent bursts, as an area of mid level cloud moves in from the east.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Little if any</b>  Risk of patchy cloud banks early in day over eastern moors.	<b>Mostly clear, risk cloud banks later.</b>  Hills clear for many hours, or much of the day. However, risk of banks of cloud forming on some eastern hills later.
<b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>90%</b>	<b>80%, may lower to 40% in east afternoon.</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchwork of cloud and sun, perhaps cloudier in east in morning. Visibility good, slight haze.	Sunny morning, tending to see skies fill in with cloud in the afternoon. Visibility generally good or very good, may become misty in the east.
<b>Temperature (at 600m)</b>	7C rising to 11C	9C lifting to 13C
<b>And in the valleys</b>	7C at dawn, rising to 17C.	18 to 21C, highest in the west.

**Planning Outlook****All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 20 May, 2024**

Pressure stays fairly high early next week. Mostly dry and quite warm for many places, but feeling cooler toward the north and east for a few days as air circulates around from the north. Easterly breezes will remain most common. Low cloud eastern hills at times, western mountains more often clear. Localised showers forming in the afternoons. Risk of more widespread rain developing by midweek with lower pressure likely, but much uncertainty about the position of developing weather systems by this stage.
