

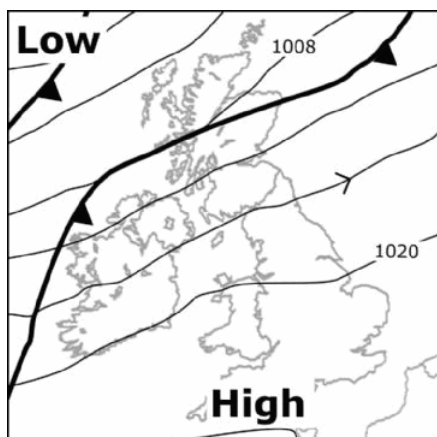
# Peak District

## General Summary for Thursday, 27 March, 2025



### British Mountain Summary:

#### Based on forecast chart for noon 27 March, 2025

Widespread upland severe gales and rain across Scotland - although breaks in the rain some eastern and far northern areas (sometimes snow higher tops far north). South into England and Wales, less windy, particularly morning and away from hills open to the sea to the southwest, very little if any rain.

### Headline for Peak District

Increasingly windy; chance isolated drizzle.

## Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 27 March, 2025

<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>	Southwesterly increasing from 20 to 30mph, perhaps locally 40mph toward dusk.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	Increasingly affecting comfortable walking in afternoon on exposed higher terrain.
<b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Rain unlikely</b> Chance of a little drizzle toward and north of the M62 by dusk.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Very little</b> Until mid morning and perhaps late on in drizzle, patches above 450m
<b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>80%</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchwork of sunshine. Excellent visibility
<b>Temperature (at 600m)</b>	6 to 8C. Feeling below freezing point on higher tops afternoon.
<b>And in the valleys</b>	14 to perhaps locally 16C in the afternoon.

## Peak District - Looking Ahead

	Friday 28 March	Saturday 29 March
<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>	Westerly 25 to on higher tops occasionally 35mph, squally near showers.	Westerly around 15 or 20mph, perhaps 25mph at first and again toward evening.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	<b>Considerable wind chill. Frequent buffeting, especially near precipitation.</b>	<b>Mostly small.</b>
<b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Hail showers, risk lightning</b> Hail and snow showers, isolated thunder. Most of morning little precipitation. Precipitation mostly rain below 600m.	<b>Rain unlikely</b>
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Frequently covering higher tops.</b>  Cloud base changing in and out of showers: mostly above 600m by midday, but patches below 500m in showers.	<b>Very little by late morning</b>  Cloud base above the hills by late morning.
<b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>70%</b>	<b>80%</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	Bursts of sun - most sun easternmost hills. Hazy.	Patchwork of sunshine. Very good or excellent visibility.
<b>Temperature (at 600m)</b>	3C. Will feel as cold as minus 8C directly in the wind.	2C
<b>And in the valleys</b>	Typically 9C, although sudden drops of a few degrees near showers	9C western Yorkshire dales to 11C elsewhere.

## Planning Outlook

### All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 28 March, 2025

Frequently windy with intermittent rain (or widely snow and hail showers on Friday) until early next week. Pressure is then likely to build markedly over and east of Britain, bringing the return of dry and sometimes warm and sunny weather for much of next week.
