


Peak District

General Summary for Wednesday, 30 April, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 30 April, 2025

Fine and warm, or very warm Wales and Pennines. Strong sunshine, some thin high cloud; beware sunburn and dehydration. Toward northwest Scotland, strengthening southwesterly winds, more cloud at times, one or two brief showers. Into night, some rain moves into Scotland from the west.

Headline for Peak District

Sunny and very warm, light winds.

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 30 April, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	South to southwesterly 10mph or less.
Effect of wind on you?	Negligible
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No rain
Cloud on the hills?	None expected
Chance of cloud free summits?	100%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Bright sunshine, some thin high cloud. Visibility very good, but may start hazy.
Temperature (at 600m)	12C rising to 18C.
And in the valleys	9C at dawn, but soon 18C early morning, rising to locally 25C by mid afternoon.

Peak District - Looking Ahead

	Thursday 1 May	Friday 2 May
How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 10-20mph.	Variable or northwesterly, 10-15mph or less.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small	Small
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Most or all day dry Toward evening, risk of localised bursts of rain forming or drifting in from the south; chance of thundery downpours from dusk into the night, mainly southern areas.	Possible early rain Risk of patchy rain from overnight into early morning, most likely toward the south. Fading out to leave a dry day.
Cloud on the hills?	No cloud expected	Lifting and clearing Possible varied cloud banks over hills from dawn into early morning, lifting generally above the hills by late morning onward.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Practically certain	70%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Extensive sunshine in the morning, some patchy cloud building in the afternoon. Good visibility but hazy.	Some sun breaking through as high cloud thins and disperses. Visibility becoming excellent, but may be hazy for several hours.
Temperature (at 600m)	14C rising to 18C.	7C rising to 12C.
And in the valleys	11C at dawn, rising to 23C.	7 to 10C at dawn, rising to 18C.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 1 May, 2025

Dropping colder across the Highlands by Thursday, near to freezing on higher summits; strong westerly winds in the north giving considerable chill factor and bringing a few showers. Warmer further south - risk of local thundery rain for Wales later Thursday. High pressure centred toward the northwest maintains plenty of dry weather over the Bank Holiday weekend with broken cloud and sun; brief local showers possible. Cool and breezy toward north and eastern mountains, lighter winds and warmer toward southwest Highlands, Cumbria and west Wales. Further into next week, risk spells of chilly and strong west-northwesterly winds particularly for the Highlands, some showery days.
