




The southernmost Pennines, covering the entire Peak District National Park, also extending north to hills accessed from Hebden Bridge, and including the hills immediately north of Manchester.

General Summary for Thursday, 1 May, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 1 May, 2025

Showery bursts and breezy in Scotland, notably west and northwest; risk of gales in the far north. Fells of northern England largely cloud-free with an odd spot of rain. Mostly sunny with gentler winds central and south Pennines. High cloud over clear mountains building in Wales with risk of thundery downpours evening into night.

Dry and sunny; feeling very warm

Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 1 May, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 10-20mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Most or all day dry Toward evening, chance of localized bursts of light rain drifting in from the south.
Cloud on the hills?	No cloud expected
Chance of cloud free summits?	Practically certain
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Extensive sunshine in the morning, some patchy cloud building in the afternoon. Good visibility but hazy.
Temperature (at 600m)	15C rising to 18C.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 2 May, 2025

Northerly winds will facilitate cold temperatures over the weekend; freezing levels will drop to mid-slopes for much of the Highlands by Sunday, further extending into England and Wales into the early week. Bursts of showers will accompany this transition, mainly in the north, then fading into only light showers here and there, falling as snow flurries on high terrain. Further into next week, risk spells of chilly and strong west-northwesterly winds particularly for the Highlands, some showery days; freezing level will vary. Very dry ground in places with fire risk.
