



General Summary for Thursday, 12 June, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 12 June, 2025

Strong southeasterly winds, reaching gale-force with powerful gusts over mountains and to some lower slopes. Much of the Highlands dry most of daytime, but bursts of rain develop near west coast, risk thundery later. Wales sees heavy rain and thunderstorms morning into middle of day, spreading over northern England afternoon.

Headline for Peak District

Warm but windy. Thundery rain most likely afternoon.

Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 12 June, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southeasterly 25 to 35mph, likely strongest during morning, gusts 40mph+ for a time, in places toward some lower elevations.		
Effect of wind on you?	Very blustery, walking arduous on higher exposed terrain, sudden buffeting gusts affecting balance. May improve later.		
How wet?	Bursts of rain forming, risk local thunderstorms		
(Precipitation and its impact)	Possibly an odd burst of rain before toward evening more widespread rain reaches Cumbria. Chance thunder.		
Cloud on the hills?	Very little, then lowering in rain		
	Most or all cloud above the hills for several hours at least. As rain develops, banks of cloud forming across the hills, in places to some lower slopes.		
Chance of cloud free summits?	90%		
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Weak sun and high cloud layers, becoming mainly overcast. Hazy, becoming poor visibility in rain.		
Temperature (at 600m)	14 to 16C.		
And in the valleys	13C at dawn, rising to 21C; feeling humid; dropping a few degrees in rain.		

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Peak District - Looking Ahead

	Friday 13 June	Saturday 14 June
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Southerly, often in range 15 to 25mph, risk gustier for a period. Breezy, may start to affect ease of walking at times on exposed higher areas.	Forecast uncertainty: South to southwesterly, 15 to 20mph, gusty around showers. Fairly small, but at times gusty wind may affect comfortable walking where exposed.
How wet?	Risk thundery downpours	Risk heavy showers forming
(Precipitation and its impact)	Sporadic heavy showers forming, possible localised thunderstorms developing again - timing uncertain, but greater risk more widespread toward evening.	Overnight heavy rain and thunderstorms likely soon clearing. Some patchy rain on and off, then scattered heavy showers developing, risk localised thunderstorms afternoon.
Cloud on the hills?	Occasional low cloud banks	Lifting and clearing
	Banks of cloud at various elevations from dawn into morning, also during and after rain at any time. May largely break up for several hours at least.	Banks of cloud at various levels from dawn, but soon confined to higher moors. Lifting above the hills during morning.
Chance of cloud free summits?	70%	80%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Some sun, mostly through high cloud. Visibility good away from rain, but likely a haze.	Broken cloud and sun. Visibility very good.
Temperature (at 600m)	13 to 17C, humid.	13C from dawn, small variation all day.
And in the valleys	Humid 14C from dawn, rising to 23C.	Humid 14C from dawn, rising to 19C afternoon.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 13 June, 2025

Staying warm and humid into Friday, a risk of scattered thundery downpours developing. A more extensive plume of torrential rain and thunderstorms likely to advance northwards on Friday night into early Saturday, followed by further heavy and possibly thundery showers. Turning cooler over the weekend. Southwesterlies then prevailing with rain at times Sunday through Tuesday, mostly western Scotland, but a trend toward higher pressure building from the south with drier conditions emerging through mid to late next week.
