

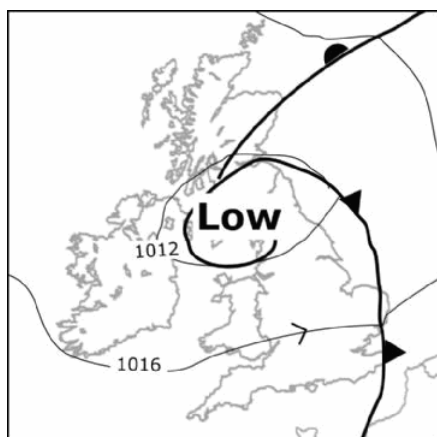
Peak District

General Summary for Saturday, 14 June, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 14 June, 2025

Varied across Britain through the day, particularly England and Wales, where some sunshine will be interspersed with rain (including thunderstorms), low cloud and changes in wind speed and direction. Changes slower in Scotland where broadly a band of thundery rain will move northwards.

Headline for Peak District

Sometimes fine: windy, sometimes low cloud, risk thunderstorm.

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 14 June, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Easterly at dawn, erratically veering through day to southwest or westerly. Generally 25 to occasionally 35mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Sometimes fairly small, but particularly morning gusts winds (including on lower slopes) will make balance difficult for periods.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain on and off mainly morning; risk thunderstorm Areas of thundery rain before dawn will have cleared or will soon clear to patches of drizzly rain then fine for several hours. Into afternoon further scattered - but brief - thunderstorms.
Cloud on the hills?	Very extensive dawn; will improve, probably clearing intermittently Fog higher slopes post dawn, but will improve as summits intermittently clear from mid morning. However, still periods when cloud lowers again to around 400m.
Chance of cloud free summits?	60%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sunshine intermittently and visibility mostly excellent by late morning.
Temperature (at 600m)	14C
And in the valleys	Rising to between 17 and perhaps 22C afternoon, warmest eastern dales.

Peak District - Looking Ahead

	Sunday 15 June	Monday 16 June
How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly, 20 to 25mph.	Between southwest and west; 20mph - perhaps 25mph higher areas.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small	Fairly small
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Small risk drizzly showers Risk one or two drizzly rain, most likely north from Saddleworth Moor.	Rain very unlikely
Cloud on the hills?	May be slow to lift off higher summits Cloud may well lift through morning to be clear of most or all summits by afternoon. However, risk that the improvement may be slow with cloud persisting above 500m well into the afternoon, and perhaps nearer 300m north from Saddleworth.	Very likely all clearing Higher tops may be foggy morning, but will gradually clear as cloud base rises although possibly not until well into the afternoon.
Chance of cloud free summits?	70%	80% by afternoon
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patches of sun - least sun north from Saddleworth. Frequently very good or excellent visibility.	Patchwork of sunshine and very good visibility.
Temperature (at 600m)	12C	15C. Will feel only just above freezing point directly in the wind.
And in the valleys	Ranging from 16 to 18C in the afternoon, coldest more western dales.	20 to 22C in afternoon

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 15 June, 2025

Colder air from the west will reach all areas by Sunday. However, low cloud still extensive on western mountains, together with drizzly showers. Little rainfall most of next week and increasingly warm, although western Scotland colder with occasional rain as weakening fronts affect particularly the NW Highlands. By mid week it should be fine everywhere - although it may not last into the following weekend.
