




The southernmost Pennines, covering the entire Peak District National Park, also extending north to hills accessed from Hebden Bridge, and including the hills immediately north of Manchester.

# General Summary for Tuesday, 17 June, 2025



# British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 17 June, 2025

A weakening front drifts slowly southwards, bringing low cloud and rain or drizzle, soon fading from most of the Highlands where cloud bases rise, but damp conditions lingering for the Lakes, only fading gradually later. Drizzly rain extends into north Wales. Moderate southwesterly breezes, but stronger at dawn.

#### **Headline for Peak District**

Breezy on tops. Largely dry, a little drizzle later northwest.

# Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 17 June, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	West to southwesterly 20mph, up to 25 or 30mph for a time early in day.	
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small, but feeling breezy over higher terrain, may start to affect comfortable walking early morning.	
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Possible light rain northwest  A weakening front coming in from north may bring drizzly showers to western hills, mainly areas north from Bleaklow during afternoon.	
Cloud on the hills?	Little if any  Generally above the hills, some patchy cloud may drift onto western higher slopes if rain develops.	
Chance of cloud free summits?	90%	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Glimpses of sun best in east, clouding over for a time at least further north/west.  Visibility very good, hazier in west.	
Temperature (at 600m)	12 to 14C.	
And in the valleys	11C from dawn, rising toward 20C afternoon, quite humid.

Chance of cloud free summits?	90%	Above 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly sunny, some fair-weather cloud. Visibility very good.	Mostly sunny. Visibility excellent, some haze may develop.
Temperature (at 600m)	12C rising to 16C.	Rising from 13 to 20C, then little change into evening and night.
And in the valleys	13C at dawn, rising to 21C afternoon.	13C at dawn, rising to 26C afternoon, quite humid.

## **Planning Outlook**

## All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 18 June, 2025

High pressure to the south will to expand northwards during midweek, with dry conditions and very warm air extending north to all regions for the second half of the week, sunshine and fair-weather cloud. Winds becoming light south to southeasterlies. Some uncertainty, fine weather may continue for most places through the weekend into early next week, but risk some showers with time.
