

General Summary for Tuesday, 1 July, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 1 July, 2025

Cooler for Scotland and northern England. Patchy rain and low cloud across central-southern Scotland and northern England, risk of developing into slow-moving heavy downpours into the afternoon. Low cloud and a little rain for Wales. West & northwest Scotland better, cloud lifting to give sunshine near the coast. Mostly light winds.

Headline for Peak District

Warm with cloud and sun. Light wind.

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 1 July, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Variable or westerly, 10mph or less, may be 10-15mph early and late in day.	
Effect of wind on you?	Small	
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Largely dry, low risk a shower Much of the day likely dry. An odd patch of light rain possible early morning. Small risk an isolated heavy shower later afternoon.	
Cloud on the hills?	Mostly clear, local cloud in morning Most cloud above the hills. Possible early mist patches, cloud banks on some slopes toward the northwestern Peak/Lancs Pennines for a few hours in morning.	
Chance of cloud free summits?	80%, to 50% northwest morning.	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Fairly cloudy, sunshine through high cloud. Visibility good, slight haze.	
Temperature (at 600m)	15C from dawn, rising slightly to 17C, still quite humid.	
And in the valleys	Humid 16C from dawn, rising to 22C.

How windy? (On the summits)	Variable or northwesterly 10 to 15mph.	Southwesterly 10 to 20mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Small	Fairly small
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Largely dry, chance showers Possible early spots from high cloud. Chance of local showers developing for a time.	Rain unlikely
Cloud on the hills?	Little if any Most likely very little cloud covering the hills all day, patches some higher slopes at first and if showers occur.	None expected
Chance of cloud free summits?	90%	Above 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Areas of high cloud may often cover the sky in morning, sunny spells increasingly developing from the west. Visibility mostly very good.	Patchwork of cloud and sun. Visibility excellent.
Temperature (at 600m)	10 to 13C.	10C rising to 14C.
And in the valleys	12C at dawn, rising to 19C afternoon.	10C at dawn, rising to 20C afternoon.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 2 July, 2025

Fresher westerly air into midweek. Some heavy showers forming, mostly in eastern Scotland and Pennine areas - with light winds some slow-moving heavy downpours, possible thunder locally. By Thursday, west to southwesterly winds increase for Scotland, with more persistent rain and low cloud returning from the west associated with fronts over the Atlantic. Friday brings a risk of heavier rain to western Scotland and gales over higher terrain for Scotland and possibly northern England, rain extending further south with time. The weekend looks unsettled with low pressure bringing heavy showery rain widely, risk isolated thunder.
