
The southernmost Pennines, covering the entire Peak District National Park, also extending north to hills accessed from Hebden Bridge, and including the hills immediately north of Manchester.

General Summary for Sunday, 6 July, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 6 July, 2025

Cloud on higher hills with patchy rain for many areas in the morning. Later, a band of showers forms from central highlands southward into England, drifting down the Pennines; showers will give heavy bursts with a risk of few lightning flashes southern Scotland. Damp in Wales early, gradually improving.

Headline for Peak District

Early rain fades to scattered showers, increasing late

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 6 July, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	West turning northwesterly 20-25mph. Becoming generally northerly though variable as evening rain approaches; speeds may lower for a time.	
Effect of wind on you?	Comfortable walking often affected by wind. Beware rapid changes in speed and direction late in the day; stability may be challenged in gusts. Feeling cool.	
How wet?	Scattered showers much of the day, risk heavy into evening	
(Precipitation and its impact)	Often raining at dawn, likely heavy in areas for a time; clearing to scattered showers from the north by late morning. Showery rain will increase in frequency into evening, becoming heavy for a time.	
Cloud on the hills?	Largely clear, patches near/after rain	
	Fairly extensive over high terrain at dawn, lifting through the morning to clear summits. Variable patches of cloud will briefly form during and after rain, most often later.	
Chance of cloud free summits?	Becoming 90%	
Sunshine?	Glimpses of sun, may improve somewhat later.	
Air clarity (below cloud)	Excellent visibility, at times poor in rain.	
Temperature (at	10C rising to 12C.	
600m)	Feeling like 4 or 5C in direct wind.	
And in the valleys	11C at dawn, rising to 15C.

Effect of wind on you?	Strongest winds affecting comfort of walking, particularly late in the day with buffeting gusts.	Some impeding winds in the morning will ease for fairly small impact.
How wet?	Little or no rain	Little or no rain
(Precipitation and its impact)	Chance of local light rain in the morning, soon fading. Small chance of showers into evening on eastern slopes	Small chance local spots of drizzly rain late in the day. May be entirely dry.
Cloud on the hills?	Tops soon cloud-free	Hills cloud-free after morning
	Patchy banks over tops at dawn soon lift above the summits.	Patchy banks of cloud drift around high edges early, soon lifting off the summits.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Above 90%	Above 90% most of the day
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Often sunny, fair weather cloud building afternoon. Excellent visibility.	Extensive morning sunshine, high cloud gradually building through afternoon. Excellent visibility.
Temperature (at 600m)	9C rising to 13C, locally warmer on south/eastern slopes.	9C at dawn, rising to 14C, warmest on eastern slopes.
And in the valleys	9C at dawn rising to 17C.	9C at dawn, rising to 17 or 18C

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 7 July, 2025

A generally settled start to the week as high pressure will become dominant across England and Wales Monday and Tuesday. Expect substantially dry conditions here through much of the week with good periods of sunshine. In Scotland, low pressure to the north will facilitate a consistent west-southwesterly wind, driving several weak fronts onto northwestern coasts as the week goes - often cloudy here with periods of rain, tending to be drier with sunny spells in east Scotland. Temperatures will be near average. Some uncertainty about next weekend - fronts are likely to continue drifting towards Scotland and north England, though possibly interrupted by dry and warm air from the continent.
